

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


We have tried in this small bolume to photograph the enormous work of a school year, and our product is not without error.


This department is one of the most popular in Missouri Wesleyan and has been growing in size for the last few years. From all indications there is a very bright feature for the Expression Department here.

VIVIAN KUEBLER. Guard. 2 years. Junior.



With the number of letter men eligible to return next year, Wesleyan should have a winning aggregation.



The most important games of the season were probably those with the "Criterions," champions of Kansas City, Wesleyan winning one of the games 14 to 13 and losing the other 12 to 13.





1926 Track Resume

Preparatory to the opening of the track season proper, Coach Collins staged an inter-class meet. The Juniors copped first honors with 59 points; the Freshmen were second with 46 points; the Sophomores took third with 37 points; while the Seniors trailed with 22 points. Coy, a Junior, was individual star, having $27\frac{1}{2}$ points.

The initial inter-collegiate meet of the season was held at Cameron, April 17, with Chillicothe Business College. Wesleyam won easily, 78 to 44. Victor Coy, the diminutive speed demon of the Collins squad, was high-point scorer with 16 points.

April 24, the Wesleyan tracksters lost a dual meet to Wentworth Military Academy by the narrow margin of 2 points. Winkleman of Wentworth was highpoint man with 16 markers.

The eternal battle between William Jewell and Wesleyan was the matter of supreme importance April 30. After the athletes of both schools had given their all, the meet stood a 61 to 61 tie. Coy's scintillating performance netted Wesleyan 18 points. B. Hargis led the Jewell scorers with 11 points.


Wesleyan speedsters achieved a notable triumph in the triangular meet at Maryville, May 8. Scoring 65 points, Collins's men defeated both the Maryville Teachers' College and Tarkio. Coy again starred with 15 points.

The State Meet of the Missouri College Union was held at Cameron May 20-21. As things developed, Wesleyan's place in this meet was chiefly one of host, for her hopes were dashed on the rocks when Coy, Bourette and Groom were unable to compete. Coy and Groom were kept off the track by severe attacks of the "flu." and Bourette was injured in the "prelims." Captain "Jim" Shultz, holder of the state record in the 100 yard dash of 10 seconds flat, courageously led the Wesleyan squad throughout the season, but never fully recovered from a serious injury received in the previous football season.

The M. C. U. meet was won by Westminster with 55 points. Wesleyan was fifth with 17% points. The only first place won by a Wesleyan athlete in this meet was in the half-mile race, when Paul Imes led the best 880 yard men in M. C. U. circles. Imes also tied for second in the 440 yard dash. Other Wesleyan men who placed were: Wylie, second in the mile-run; Robinson, second in the javelin throw; Alvin Miller, third in the two mile run; and Captain Shultz, fourth in the 220 yard low hurdles.

New Wesleyan track records set are: Coy tied "Jim" Shultz's record of ten seconds flat in the 100 yard dash, set the 220 yard dash record at 22-8/10 seconds, and the 440 yard dash record at 52-3/10 seconds; Alvin Miller ran the two-mile in 10 min., 35-8/10 seconds; Imes, Robinson, Metz, and Coy ran the mile relay in 3 minutes, 35 seconds; Robinson threw the javelin 172 ft., 8 in.

Victor Coy, M. W. C.'s stellar dash man, was elected captain of the 1927 squad, and this fact, coupled with the number of stars who are still with us, should make our 1927 track team hard to beat.



Zeta Chapter of Beta Beta Was organized at Missouri Wesleyan College in the spring of 1926. In the fall the charter members held their first business meeting, and the following officers were elected: President, Stephen H. Sims; Vice-President, Emory Lower; Secretary, Goldie Bourette; Treasurer, Mildred Bethards; and Faculty Adviser, Professor Slayton.

Missouri Wesleyan College is the first college in Missouri to establish a chapter of this fraternity. Zeta Chapter has seven members,—five active members, one alumni member, and one associate member.

Prospects for the coming year are exceedingly bright. The Biological Department is constantly adding new specimens and equipment and is becoming one of the most interesting departments in the college. The museum and aquarium contain many live specimens, and the supply shelves are filled with preserved specimens. The laboratory equipment of Missouri Wesleyan College far exceeds the state requirements.

With from six to ten prospective members in sight for the coming year Beta Beta Beta at Missouri Wesleyan should become a successful organization.

League For Industrial Democracy

The object of the Intercollegiate League for Industrial Democracy is, "To promote among college men and women an intelligent understanding of the labor movement and the movement toward a new social order based on production for use and not for profit."

The motto of the Missouri Wesleyan Chapter is taken from Lincoln: "The man who will not investigate both sides of a question is dishonest."

Members receive the News-Bulletin published about six times during the college year and pamphlets on various social and economic problems, which provide excellent material for discussion at L. I. D. meetings. Chapters are kept in touch with the activities of college groups throughout the United States, may name a representative on the National Student Council, may send delegates to the various League conferences, and may secure speakers of national and international repute through the L. I. D. Members may also become acquainted with the literature and work of other organizations interested in social progress.

The Missouri Wesleyan Chapter of the L. I. D. was organized by Clarence O. Senior during the first semester of the college year 1925-1926. Professor True Taylor has been faculty adviser for the M. W. C. Chapter since its organization. C. O. Senior was the first local President and Student Representative. When he entered Kansas University the second semester of last year, Paul K. Crawford was elected President and Student Representative.

Various subjects have been discussed at the local meetings, such as "Mergers and the New Competition," "The Situation in China," "Industrial Autocracy," "Henry Ford and His Five-Day Week," 'Compulsory Military Training," "The Labor Spy," "The Goose-Step in Education," "Economic Imperialism," "Freedom of Speech and of the Press," etc.

Kenneth Lindsay of London, England, was secured through the L. I. D. to deliver an address before the student body.

A vote held in chapel last year on a number of pertinent national and international questions attracted national attention to Missouri Weslevan College as a college with a progressive student body.



The Student Council is the chief co-operative agency between the student body and the faculty. It is composed of the President of the student body, of one representative from each of the four classes, the literary societies, and the V. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A., and of two faculty representatives. It considers in an advisory capacity the problems relative to the welfare of the student body and the college as a whole. The utmost frankness is observed in discussing the problems, and real opinions of the students are thus secured. and it is through this medium that the students participate somewhat in the governing of the school, for through their representatives they may feel that their ideas are considered.

This organization is a comparatively new institution in M. W. C., being now in its third year of existence, but it has been successful in its aims. One of the responsibilities assumed by it this year is the preparing of programs for chapel on Friday mornings, which day was set aside as assembly day. Two members of the council arranged these programs for four weeks when these duties were assumed by two other members. The result has been very many interesting chapel programs.

The council has voted to abolish the Thanksgiving vacation for next fall, since it will be "homecoming" time. It is believed that a great many more old "grads" will return if school is in session.

The Student Council has in fact dealt with all the vital problems which arise in the general trend of school life. It is fostering a "booster" program for Missouri Wesleyan, which includes advertising, "booster" trips, and all means by which the school may be benefitted.

The welfare of the college has been this organization's guiding thought, and it is hoped that its success will continue.
