Science is one of the oldest if not the oldest of all studies. Despite its venterability it is the most up-to-date of all high school subjects, for to keep up with the strides of science is truly a task worthy of any student's time.

The Science courses in C. H. S. is one of the most popular in school, having an enrollment second only to the commercial department. In the classroom and laboratory work the most practical of problems are discussed. Such things as weather forecasting, sanitation, heating, machines, photography, musical instruments, electric motors, lighting, radio and X-Ray, are studied and demonstrated.

From the above can be gained an idea of the practical side of the Physics and Science courses. To be able to answer one of Life's questions and to know the "why" of everyday phenomena is the aim of science in C. H. S.


MISS RAUSIN

Seven years ago our Commercial department was organized. The department has been very popular with the students as shown by the large number enrolled every year in commercial subjects.

Each year new equipment has been added until today the commercial department of Cameron High School ranks with the best equipped and efficient departments in the State. Last year three new Underwood typewriters were put in, making a total of fifteen typewriters, Remington, Underwood and L. C. Smith machines.

Many of this year's graduates are planning to continue their commercial work by attending some business college. Others are preparing to take the Civil Service Examination for typists and stenographers.

The courses offered in this department are Shorthand, Typewritiing and Bookkeeping, which are of great practical service to the students taking them.

MISS THEILMANN

The Teacher Training course was introduced into Cameron High School in 1915. This year it was taught by Miss Gertrude Theilmann, and the enrollment was nine in Senior Class and thirteen in the Junior Class.

The course consists of a review of Arithmetic, Reading and Grammar, Physiology or Child Study, Methods of Teaching and School Management.

This class has attended two Rural School Demonstrations and made many visits to classes in the rural schools and to the grades. Each Senior has spent one week in a rural school doing practice teaching. For several months the rural teachers and teacher training classes, both College and High School, met together once each month to listen to interesting programs, hear practical problems discussed, and enjoy a social hour together.

The class has been divided up into committees, to care for the room, and thus have had experience which will be useful to them in caring for their own school rooms next year.


The training given in Vocational Home Economics is extremely difficult to measure, either in results or values. Numbers of garments and quantities of food served are but indicators of the progress made and the training received. While the primary purpose of the course is to teach the pupils to sew and cook, there is also a secondary value not to be overlooked. Parallel with the making of garments and the cooking of food, instructions are given in the economic, artistic and hygenic aspects of the subjects related to the home, a!l of which will live with the girl and become a part of her life.

The value of this knowledge, together with the ideals of home-making received can never be estimated. The results of Home Economics students are measured not only by the preparation and serving of meals, the cleaning of rooms, and the making of garments, but also by the attaining of a hospitality that will be remembered long after the menu is forgotten.


When the Smith-Hughes Bill was passed by Congress, appropriating State and Federal aid to high schools for the teaching of agriculture to farm boys, Cameron High was one of the first schools to take advantage of it. Being one of the pioneers in this line, it also has the largest enrollment of any school in the State.

Four years of Agriculture are given, making a total of six units abtainable in Cameron High.

The equipment in Agriculture is outstanding, and the library is one of the largest and best in the State, and new Bulletins are being added daily.

The first two years are taken up by a study of Soils and Farm Crops, Animal Husbandry and Feeding; the latter two years by more specialized work. Every student is required to carry out a project under the supervision of the instructor, along some phase of the work.

Spraying of fruit trees, selecting of seed corn, testing of seed corn for germination, judging and scoring grain, testing milk and cream, making balanced rations, scoring and judging livestock and shop work, constitute a major portion of the work.


"A sound mind in a sound body" is the slogan of the Physical Education Department.

The Physical Education department is vitally interested in the two aims of education, namely to make a living and to enjoy life.

Whether our livlihood depends upon mental efficiency or physical strength, it is essential for proper success that we have a good healthy body.

If it depends upon mental efficiency, that efficiency cannot be maintained unless there is a good body to support it. If it depends upon physical strength, there must be a strong healthy body or work cannot be accomolished.

That it is vitally concerned with the second cannot be denied, because none of us really enjoy life unless we enjoy good health.

The educators of our State realize that to spend money only on the development of the childs mind is the equivalent of building a house upon the sand, and in order to insure a firm foundation for future citizens, they have made physical education a compulsory part of the curriculum in the secondary schools of the state.

Our department reaches over fifty percent of the high school boys through the physical education course or athletics, and over thirty five per cent of the girls, and it is hoped that in the near future there will be an even greater percentage obtaining the benefits from this department.
