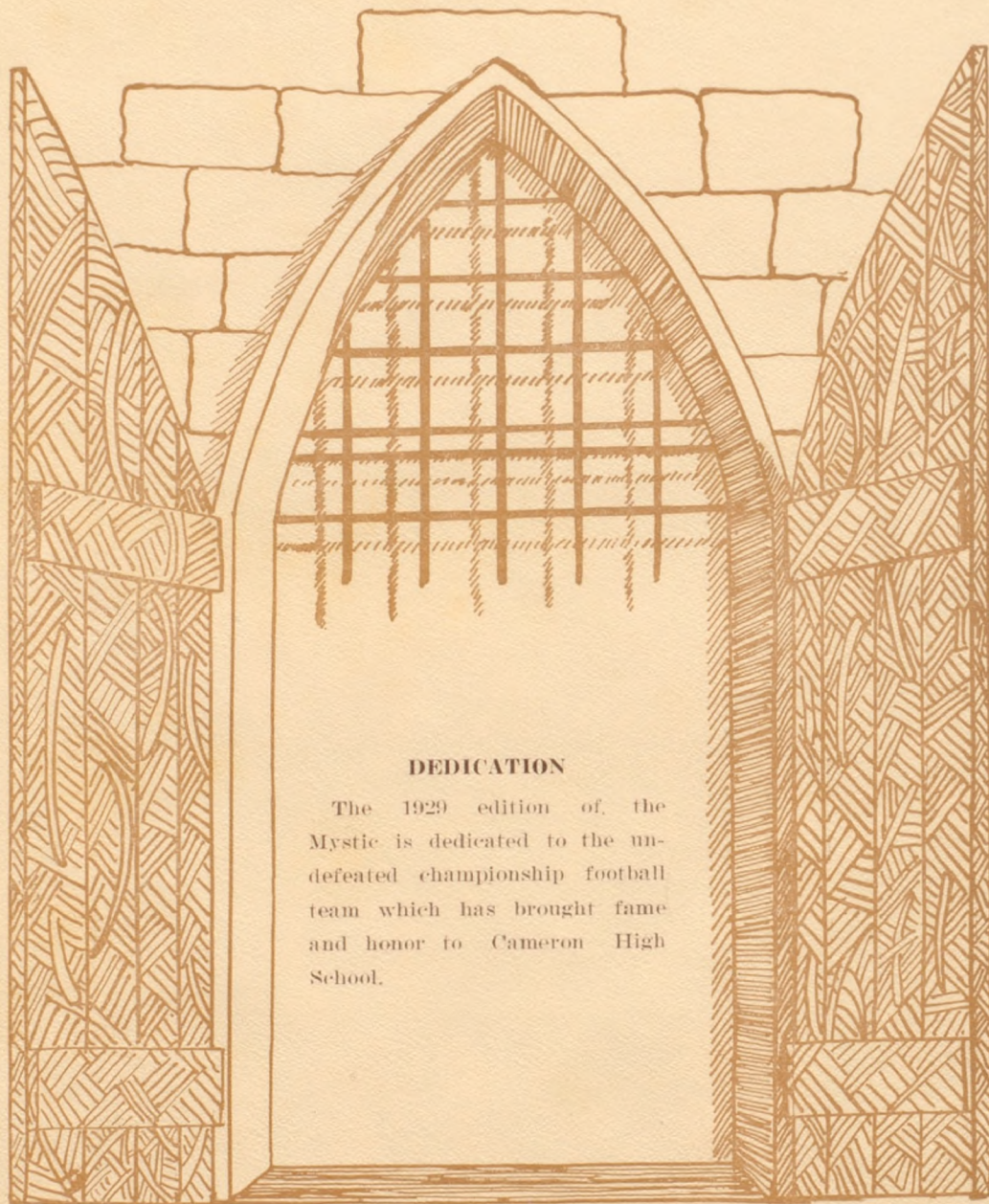
THE FOREWORD

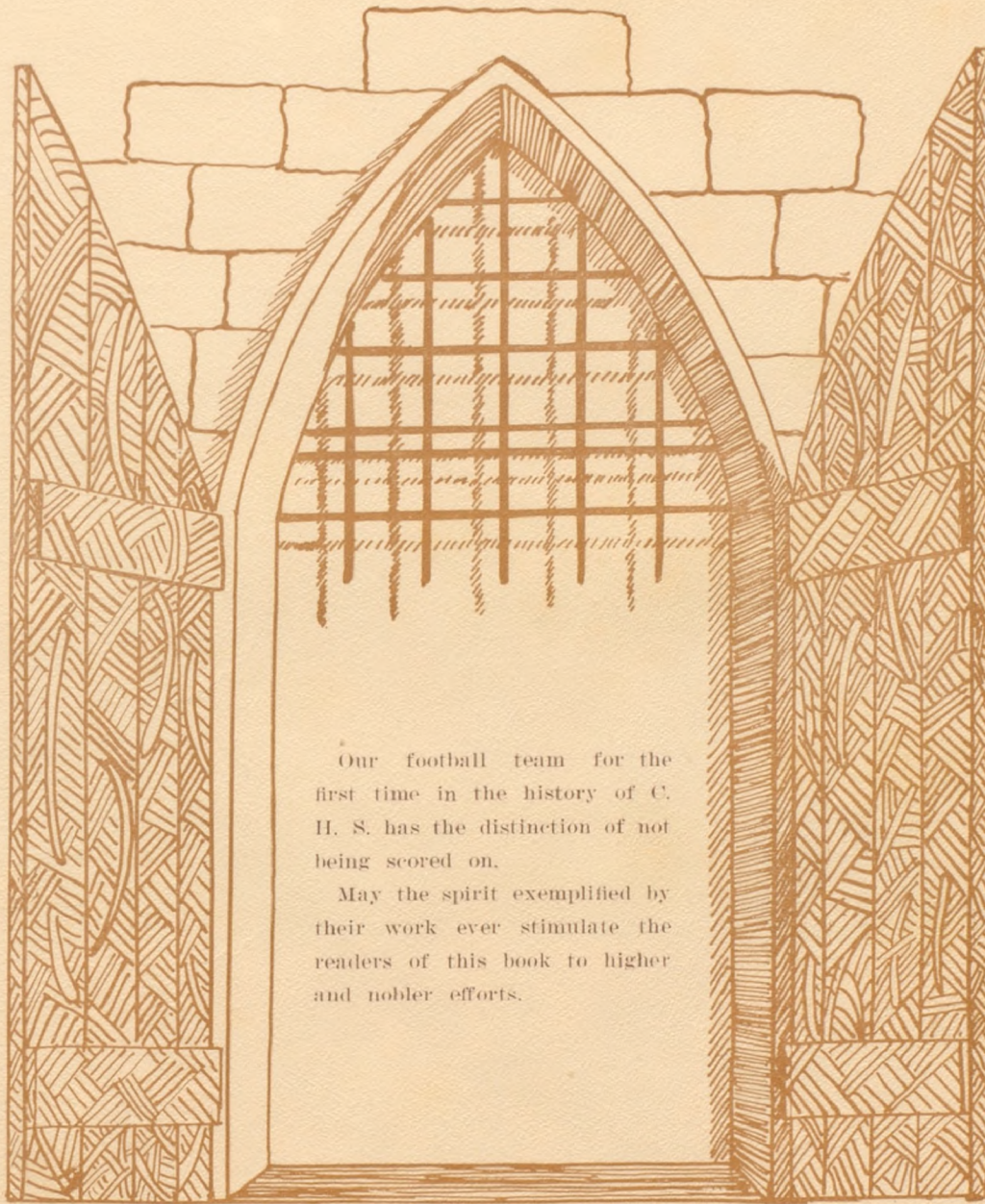
VISION

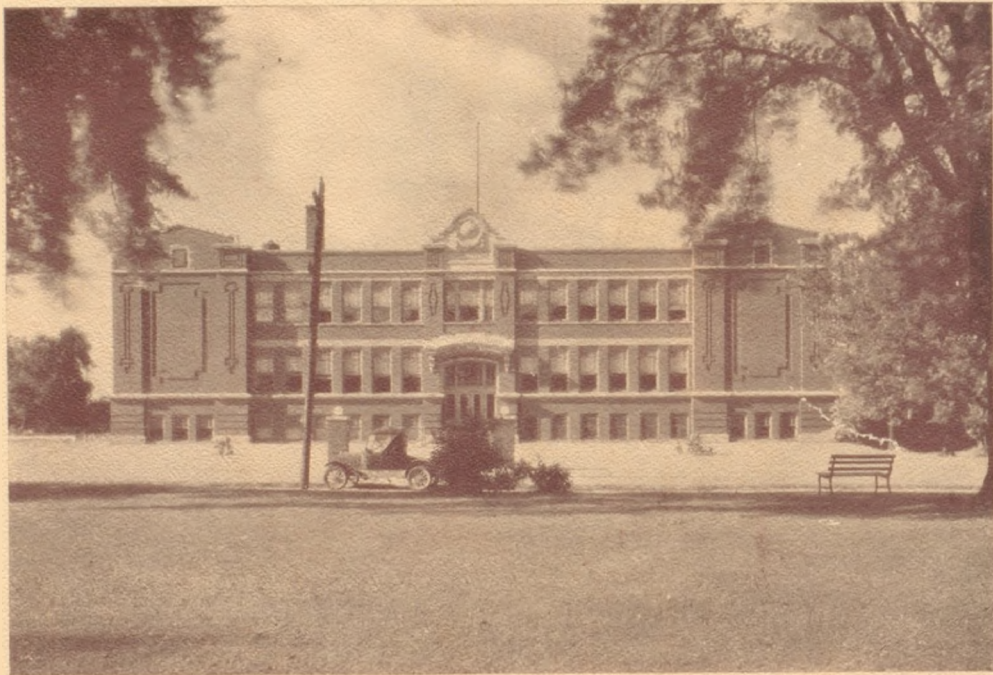
DEDICATION

Our football team for the first time in the history of C. H. S. has the distinction of not being scored on.

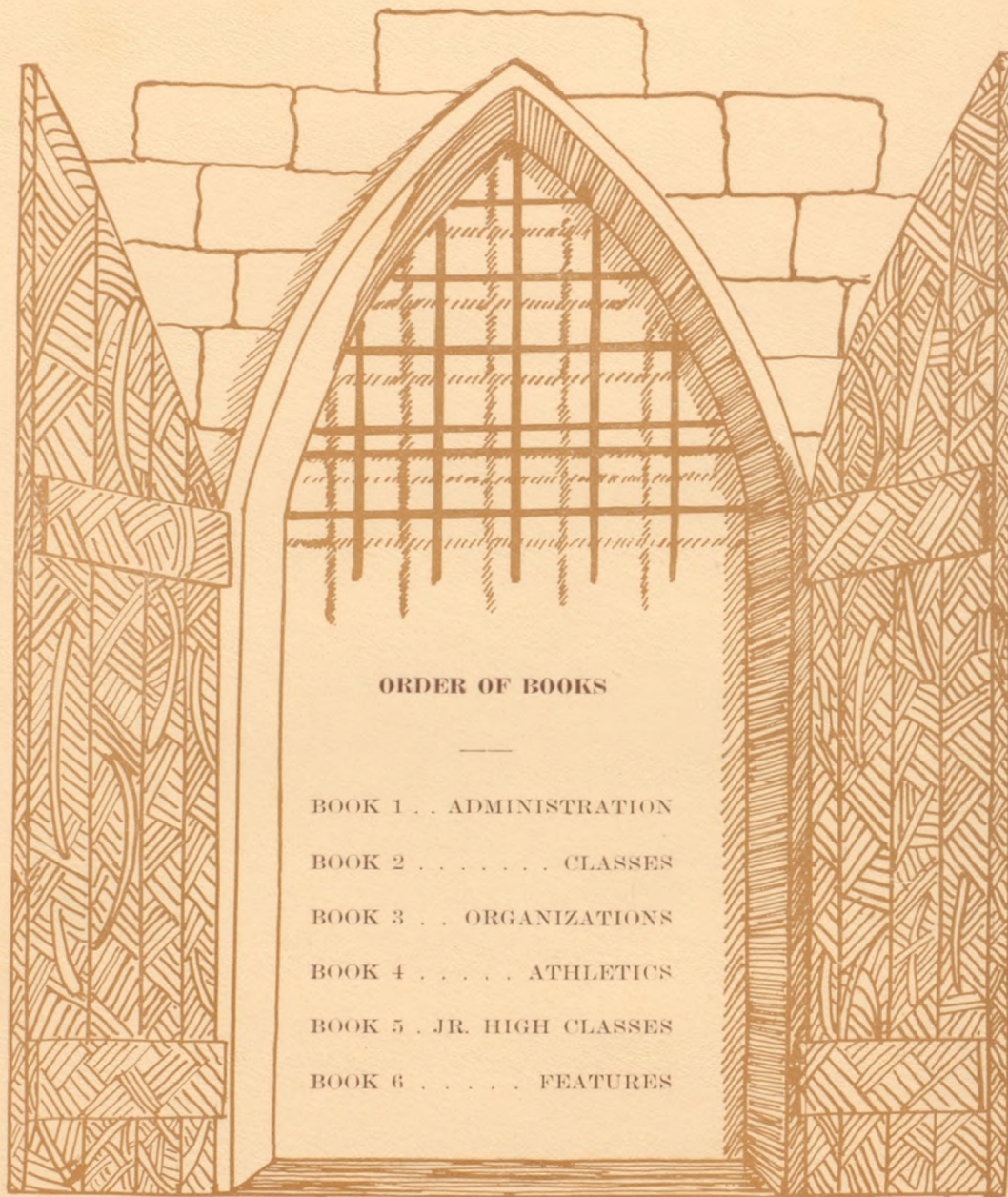

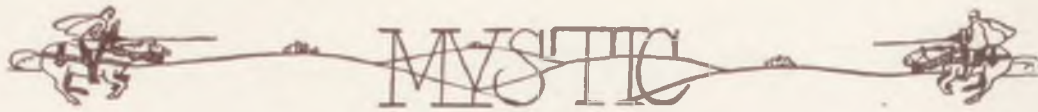
BOARD OF EDUCATION

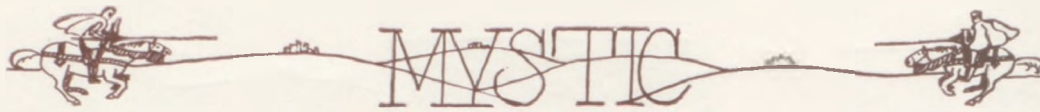

Vocational Agriculture is the only department in the Cameron High School where the boys earn while they learn. Last year the boys averaged \$104.79 for each completed project, or a total of \$2,204.42 for the entire school. A sale of purebred hogs was held last year in which was sold \$1,067.50 worth of breeding hogs to farmers in this community. The Community Improvement contest is another feature of the Vocational work that brings the class room nearer to the farm. Points are given for various operations put into practice on the home farm. Several of the boys will no doubt receive medals for their work this year.

Project work, field trips, shop work and practical class room instruction help to make Vocational Agriculture a popular and attractive course for farm boys.

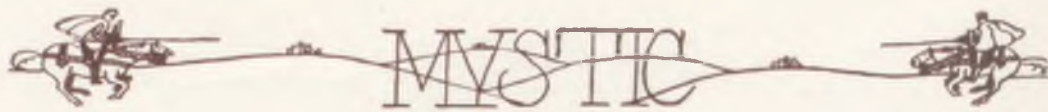

"We believe every child has a right to demand a well trained and efficient teacher. To this end Teacher Training schools have been established."—Charles A. Lee, State Superintendent of Education.

Cameron High School, during the years since 1915 when Teacher Training was first placed in the curriculum, has endeavored to maintain a high standard, and to meet the purpose for which the course was created, as stated above.

No student who has done below medium grade work is permitted to take the course. Those successfully passing examination, which is given by the State Department, at the end of the course, are granted certificates to teach in the public schools of Missouri.





VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

The future is very bright for our Vocational work next year, if we may believe the reports that have been received from George W. Reavis, State Director of Vocational Education.

The George-Menges-Reed Vocational Bill was passed by the last Congress. It provides increasing appropriations for Vocational Education during the next ten years. Information received from the State Department of Vocational Education indicates that Missouri High Schools will receive next year, \$9,000.00 additional for Vocational Agriculture alone. Vocational Home Economics will receive \$8,300.00. The present session of the Missouri Legislature is expected to match this federal grant. The foregoing amounts are then prorated back to all high schools maintaining Vocational Education courses. Cameron, therefore, will receive a proportionate share of these funds.

The State Legislature was asked to appropriate \$452,000.00 for Vocational Education in Missouri during the next biennium. No reports have been received that this was not done, thus we can be practically assured that the entire amount has been set aside for this purpose.

We have received a total amount of \$3,476.17 State aid for our Vocational work since July 1, 1928. Statements made in the preceding paragraph lead us to believe that these appropriations will be increased somewhat next year.

Vocational Education in our high school should make marked progress within the next two or three years. We have splendid instructors for these courses. Mr. Carl Gross is a well-trained man in his work. He has done excellent work during the past eight years. He has an outstanding program outlined for the coming year.

Largely due to the efforts of Miss Belle Pollard and Miss Alta Motter, the two Vocational Home Economic instructors, this department is ranked high by the State Department, among the best in Missouri. We are one of the three schools in Missouri selected by the State Department to put on a Home Economics exhibit at the State Fair in August, 1929.

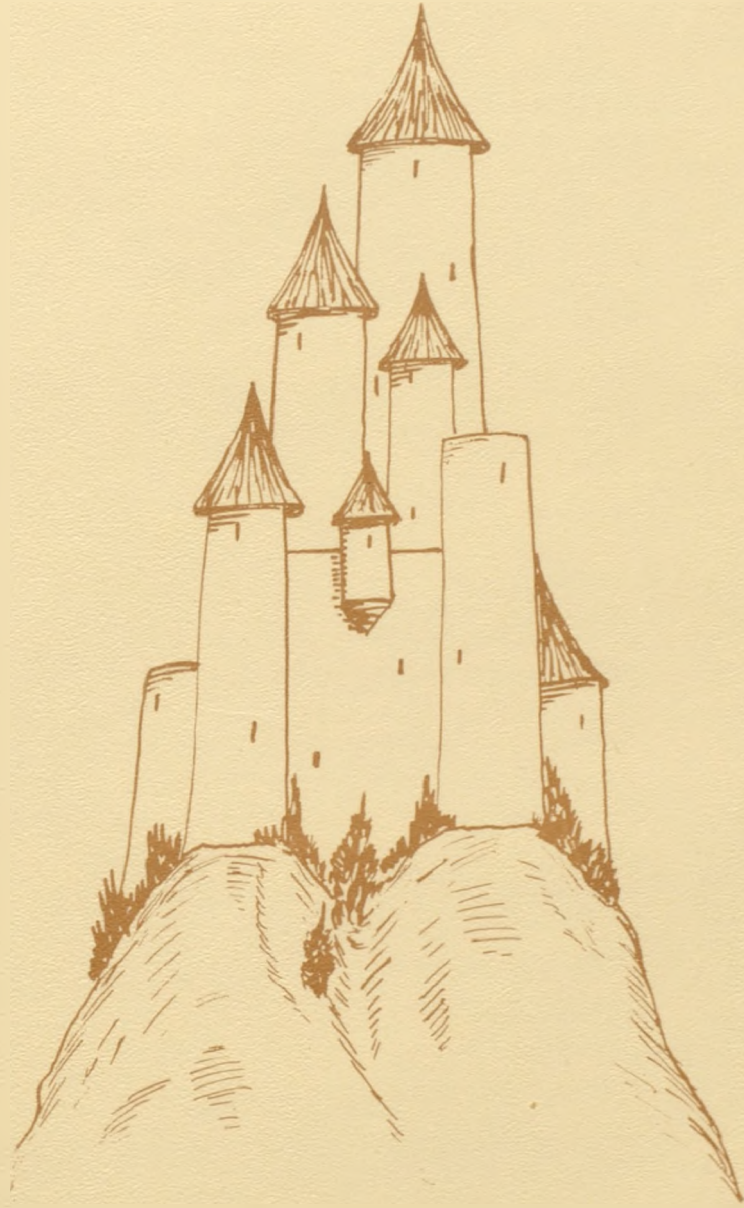
TEACHER TRAINING

According to recent advices from the State Department of Education, there will be little change, if any, in the Teacher Training work next year. This is an important work and should be continued. Our Teacher Training course was given a high rating this year by the State Department of Education.

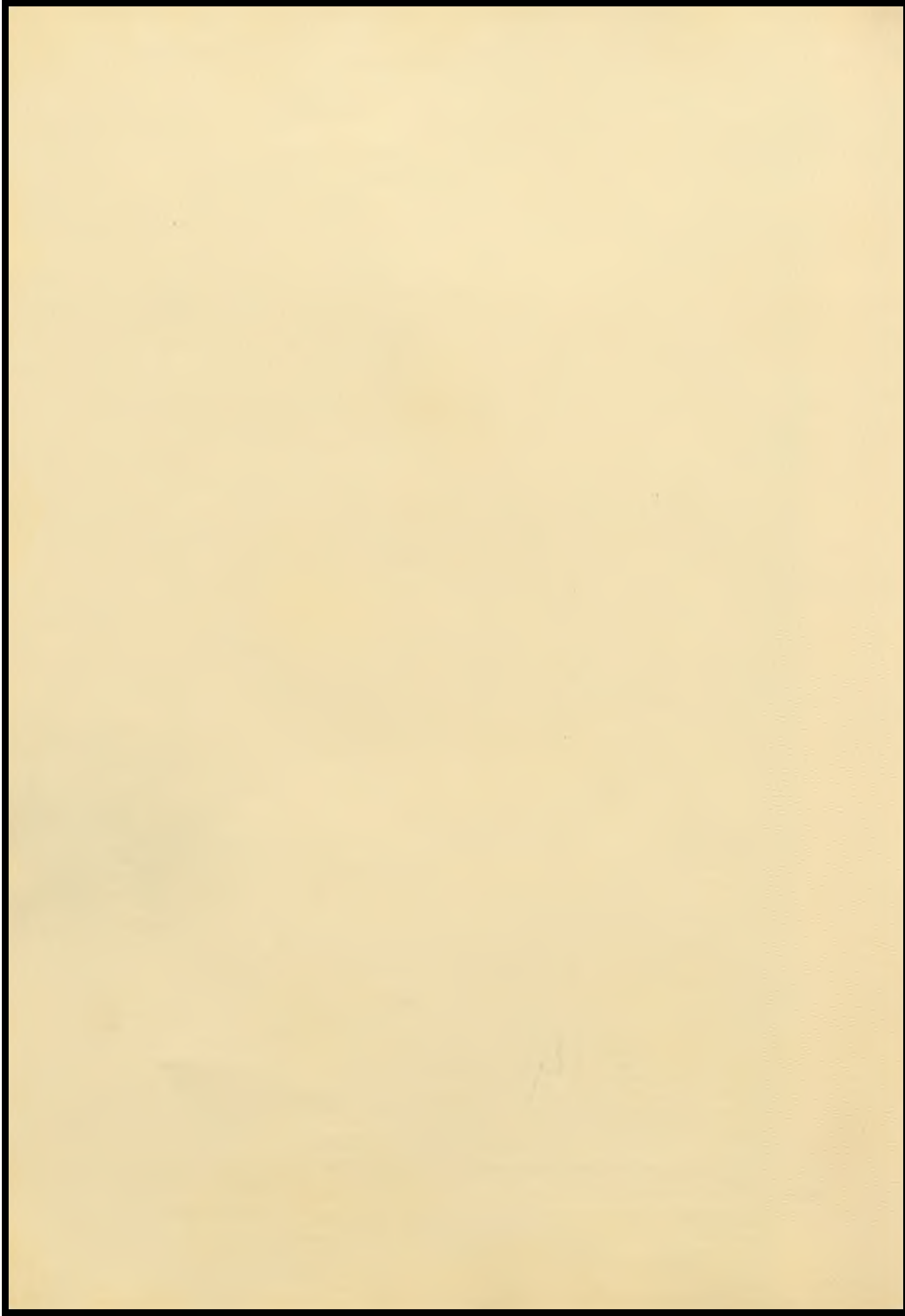
We have received \$1,560.00 State aid for Teacher Training this year. This is considerably in excess of the amount expected. Next year we will probably receive \$900.00.

Twenty students took Teacher Training this year. They have received excellent instruction from Mrs. Pearl Warner, who has prepared herself thoroughly for this task. She is now working out her Master's thesis at the Kansas State University on the "Status of Teacher Training in Missouri High Schools." It will be an important contribution to Teacher Training institutions in general.

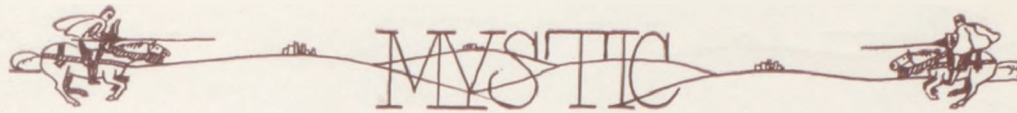

Then came the great climax—the Thanksgiving day game with Liberty. The first half of the contest was closely played, but in the last period, the Dragons constantly forged ahead until at the final whistle, the score stood 38 to 0 in favor of Cameron.
