




FOREWORD

If the home is to fulfill its highest aim—that of training useful citizens, it must be a pleasing place to dwell, and its members must be contented and happy.

The aim of Vocational Home Economics is to train girls to be homemakers of the highest type. In order to accomplish this, our course is outlined to include planning, preparing, and serving of meals, with special attention to nutrition, management, and costs: family relationships; child care; house planning, furnishing, and decoration: selection, care, and construction of clothing.

In order to teach the underlying principles of the science of home life, our course is expanded to include the study of Related Science. In our program of Related Art we teach the principles of art as they apply to problems of every-day life.

In order that classroom work may carry over into the home life of the girl, our course is planned to include home projects for each member of the class.

In 1918 there were three classes in Vocational Agriculture in the state, Today there are 133 all day schools or classes, which serve 82 counties in the State. Approximately 3,700 students are enrolled in these courses. Cameron boasts of forty-two regularly enrolled farm boys who are doing fine work both for themselves and for the school and community. The Future Farmers chapter was organized this year and a splendid program of work was adopted by the boys.

Last year at the State Fair, North Missouri Fair, and at the Midwest Vocational Show at Kansas City, Cameron boys were in the limelight with their Baby Beef calves and Sow and Litter projects. Over one thousand dollars was won in prize money and many ribbons.

The project for last year showed a net profit to the community, and to the boys of \$3,045.94, an average of \$108.42 for each completed project. Vocational Agriculture is one of the departments in school—where—the boys earn while they learn. In addition to project work the boys spend several periods a week in Farm Shop where general repair work, forge work, soldering, rope work, and other farm jobs are studied. Regular class work—includes—field work, judging of live stock, pruning, spraying, and many other jobs that the future farmer will have to deal with. Judging teams are sent to Columbia, Junior Farmers Week, to compete in the State contests.—Last year four boys won medals given by the Weekly Kansas City Star for work done in the community improvement contest.



The opening of the season found eight lettermen back at their positions and an excellent supply of new maerial to replace the lettermen lost through graduation.




Track was the last of the major sports of C. H. S. to attract much interest. However the showing made by the team was very good.



There were several outstanding men on the squad and several of these are back to make this year's record as good as last year.



Oration: First, Gray Dorsey; second, Walter Baker.


