
Another year full of memories has taken its course at CHS.


For those of you who know this year as your last, and those of you who know it as the first, always remember an important thing: There is no ending, just a new beginning.










One Last Look at Spirit Week "93"


Looking at the stock markets reports are Courtney Fischer and Jaimie Watkins, voted most likely to succeed.











Holly is a very nice friendly guy who loves excitement and opportunity. We were very fortunate to have Holly in our school and for him to graduate with the class of 1994.








he special services department is a place for older special service students to learn basic classroom knowledge and also skills that will help them through everyday life. There are eleven students in the program.



Under the direction of new head coach Ray Wall, the squad finished with a 8-16 record. The starting nucleus of the team ironically seemed to rest in the hands of the




