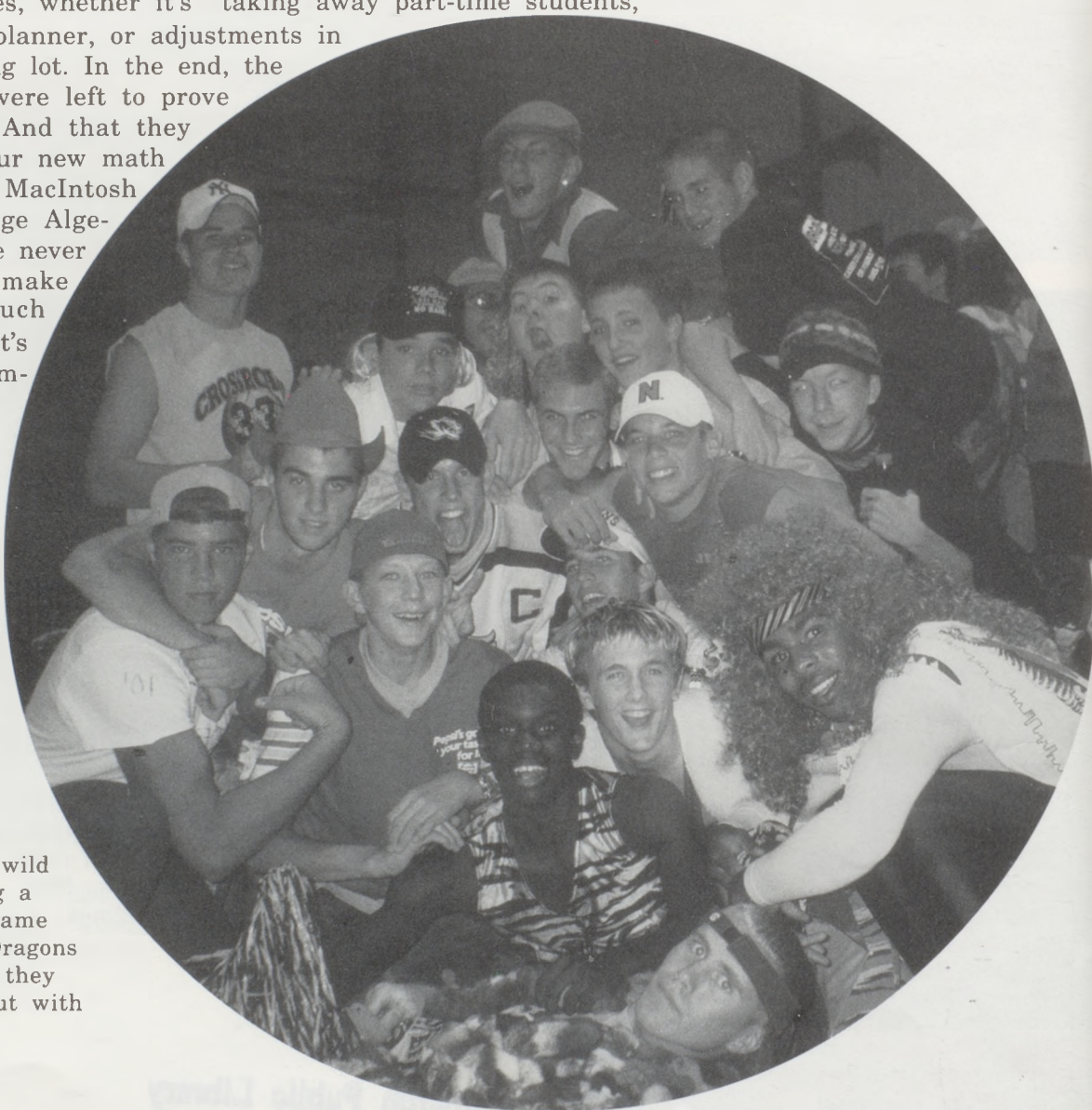

With a Theme Like Our's...

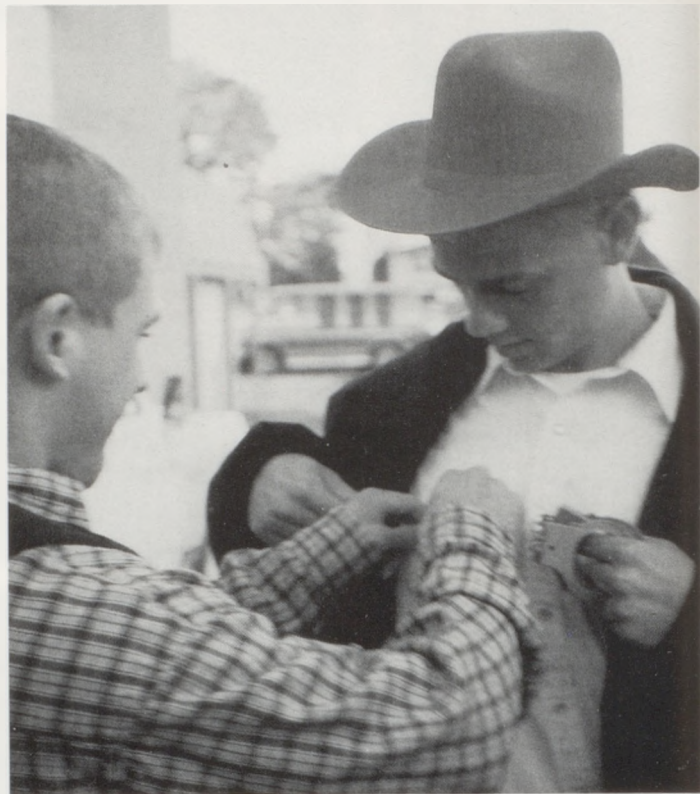
Anything goes!

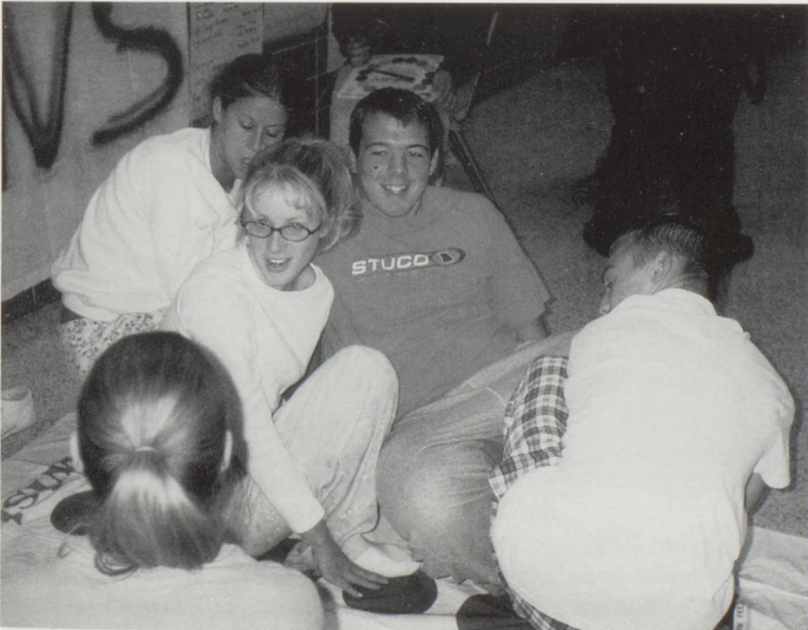

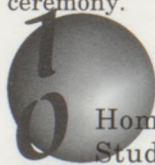

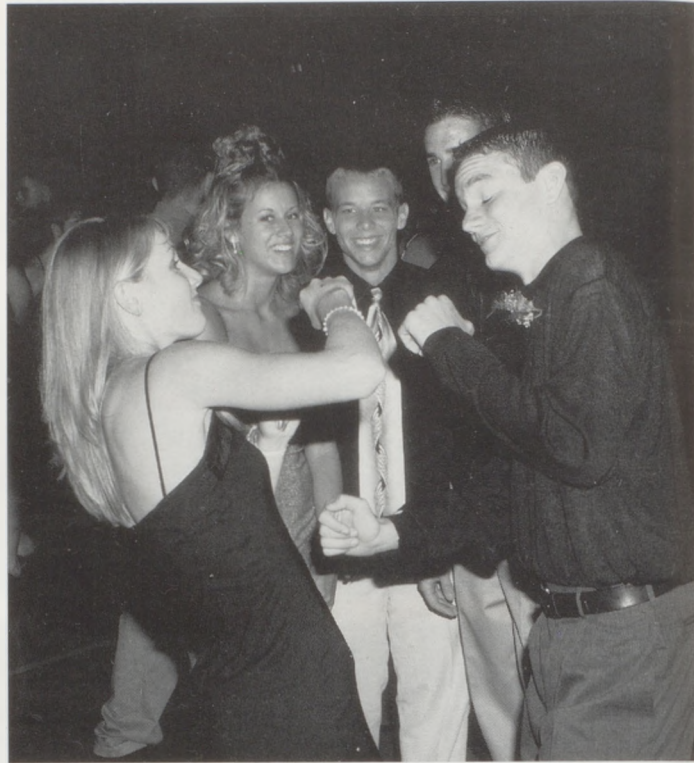
A Week to Remember

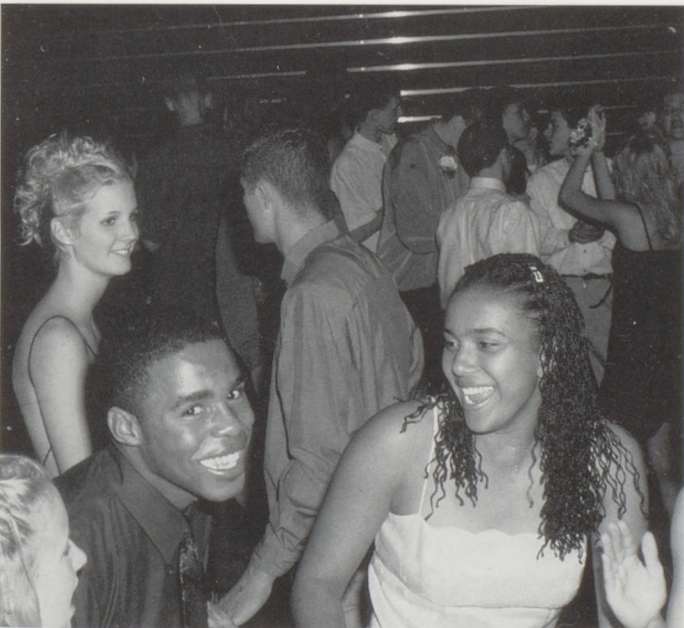

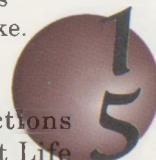

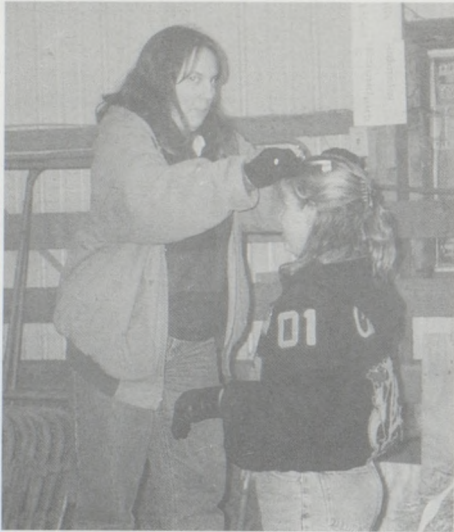
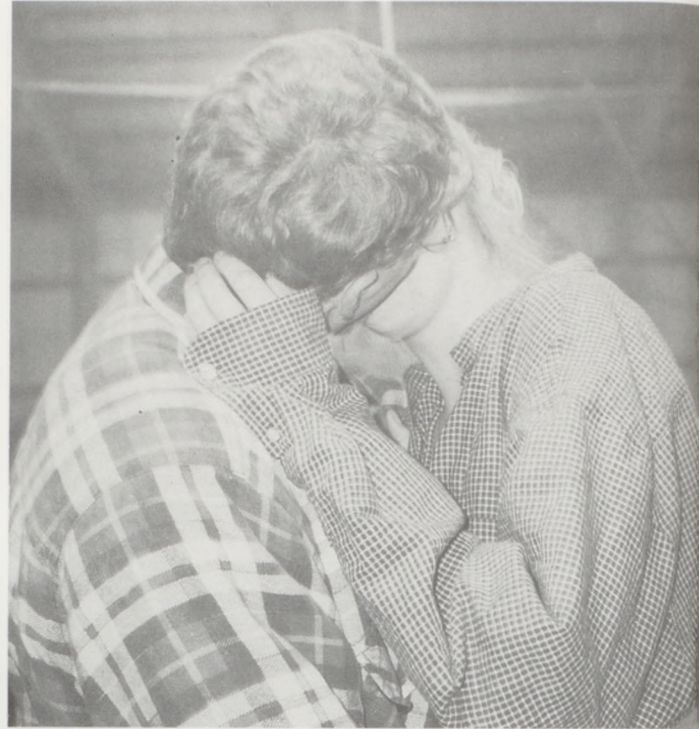
Bringing Down the Barn

A night of dancin', hay bale tossin', and cider chuggin'.

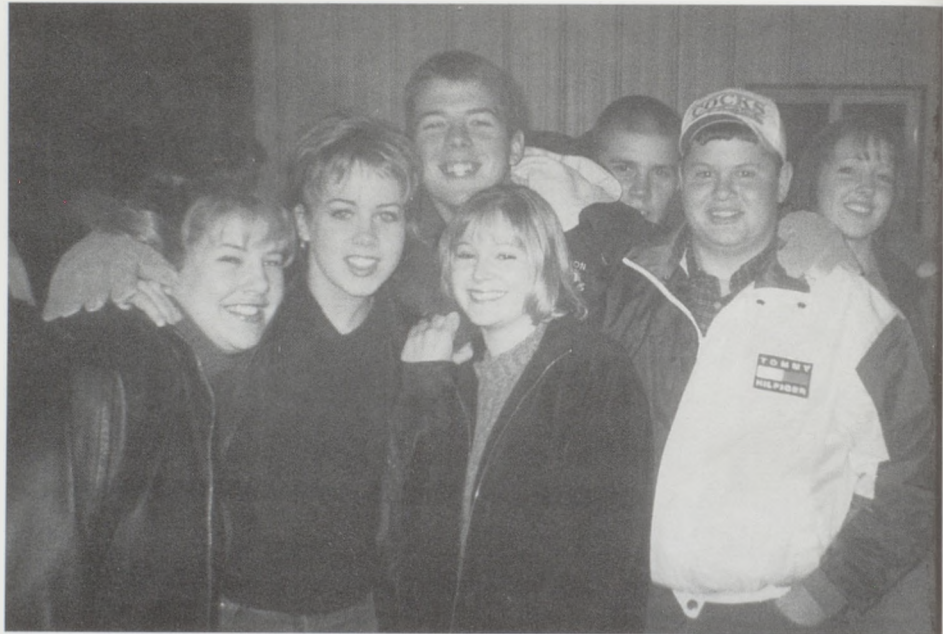

In true barnwarming tradition, Jennie Ecton and her date must kiss since she drew the lucky red ear of corn.

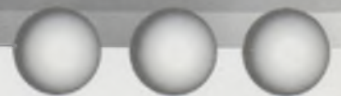

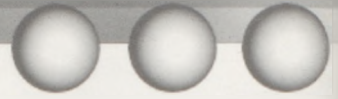
“There’s an opening

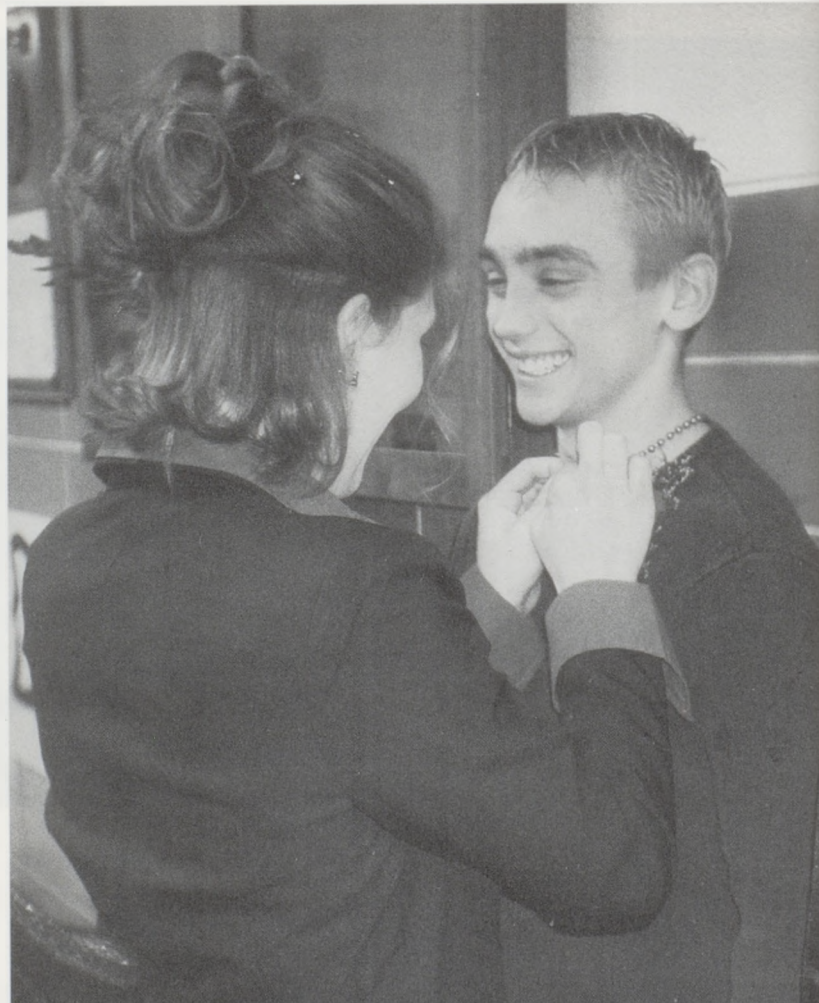

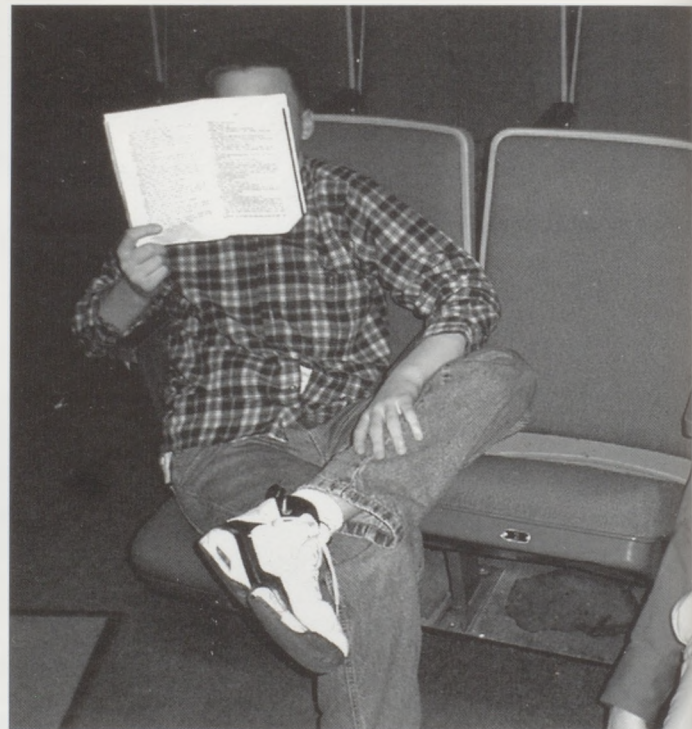
Starting at Cameron High School!

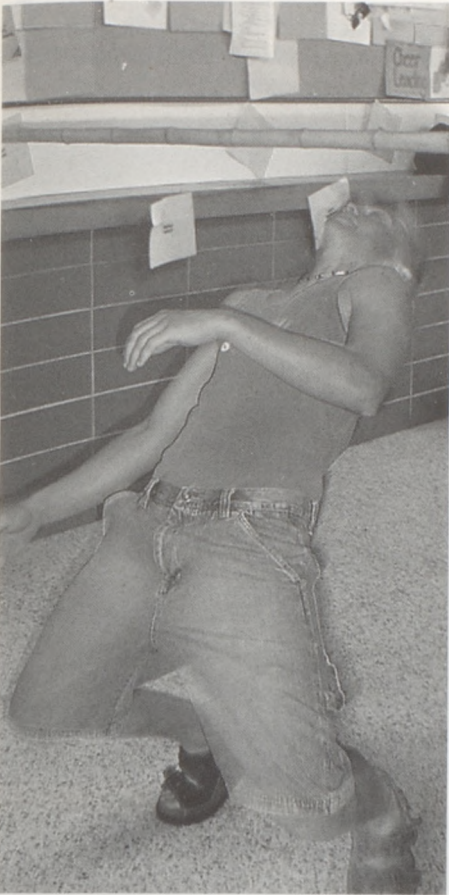

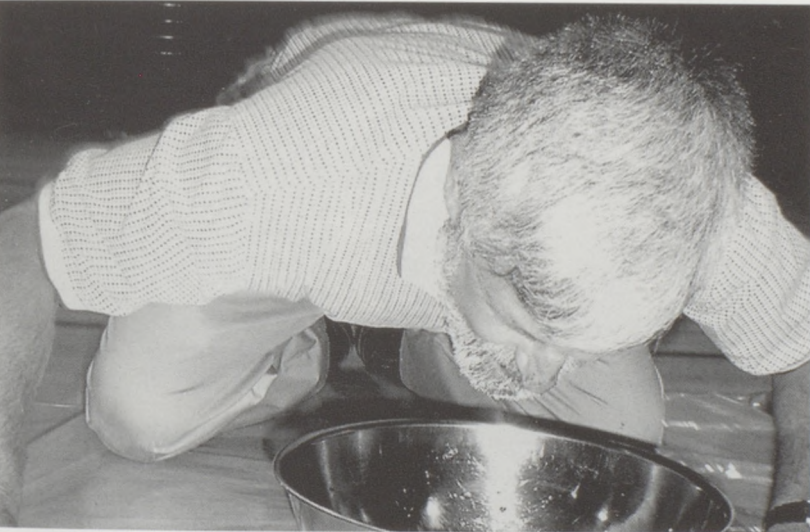

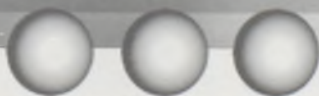

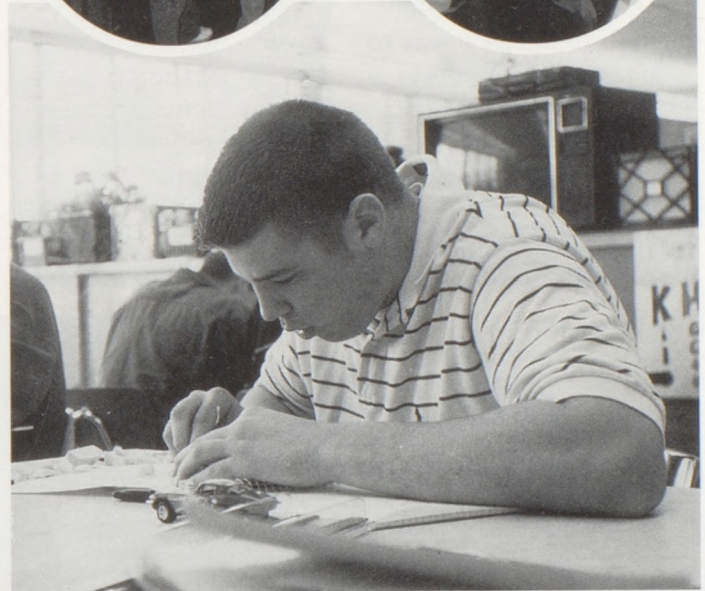

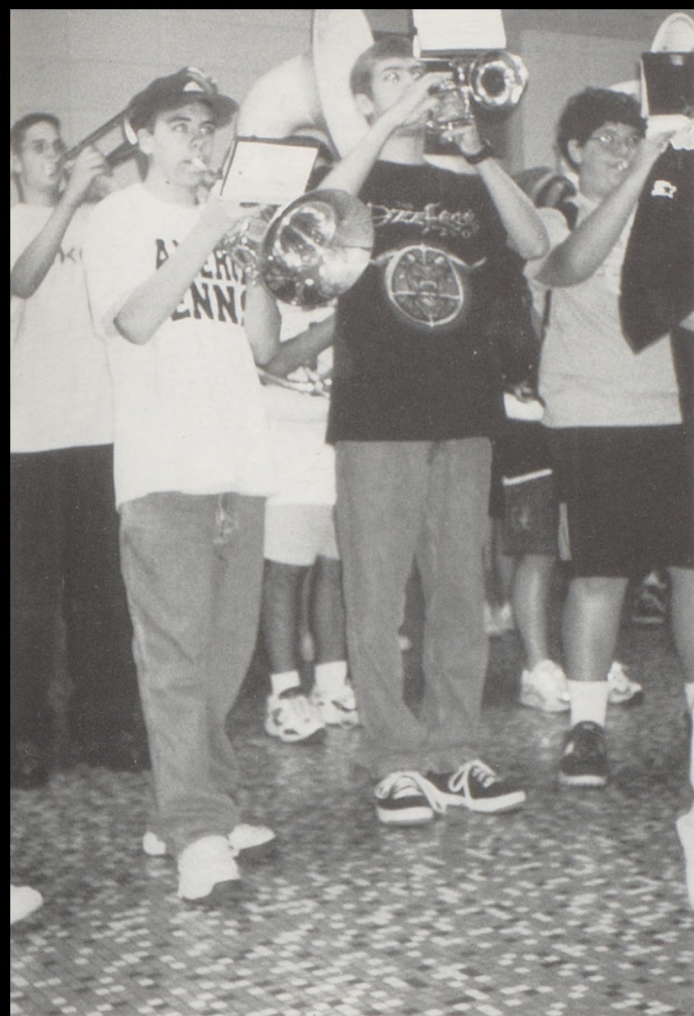

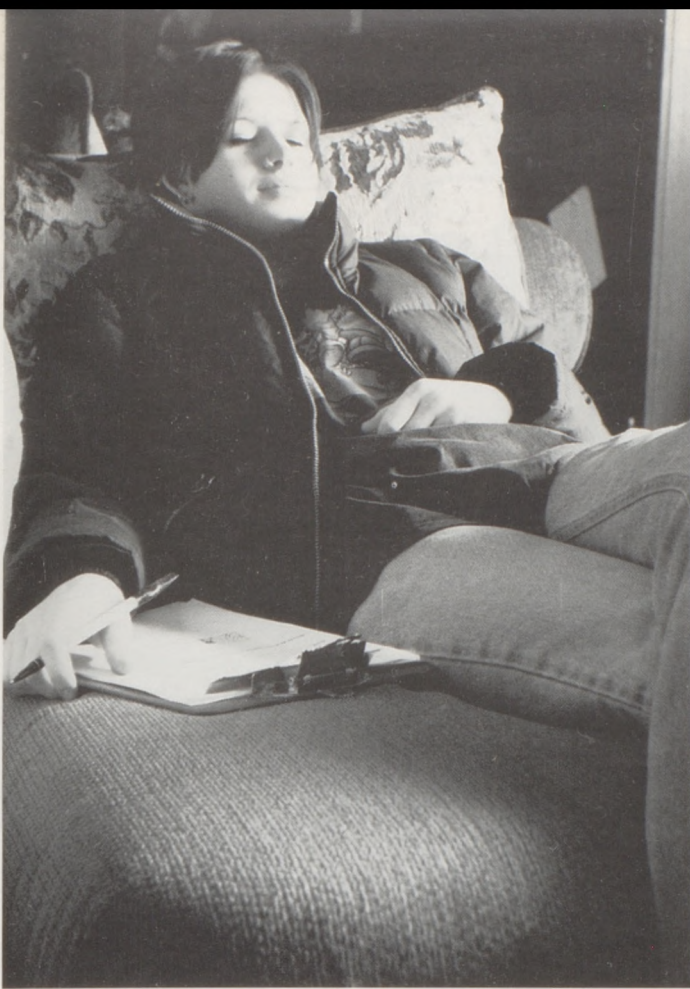

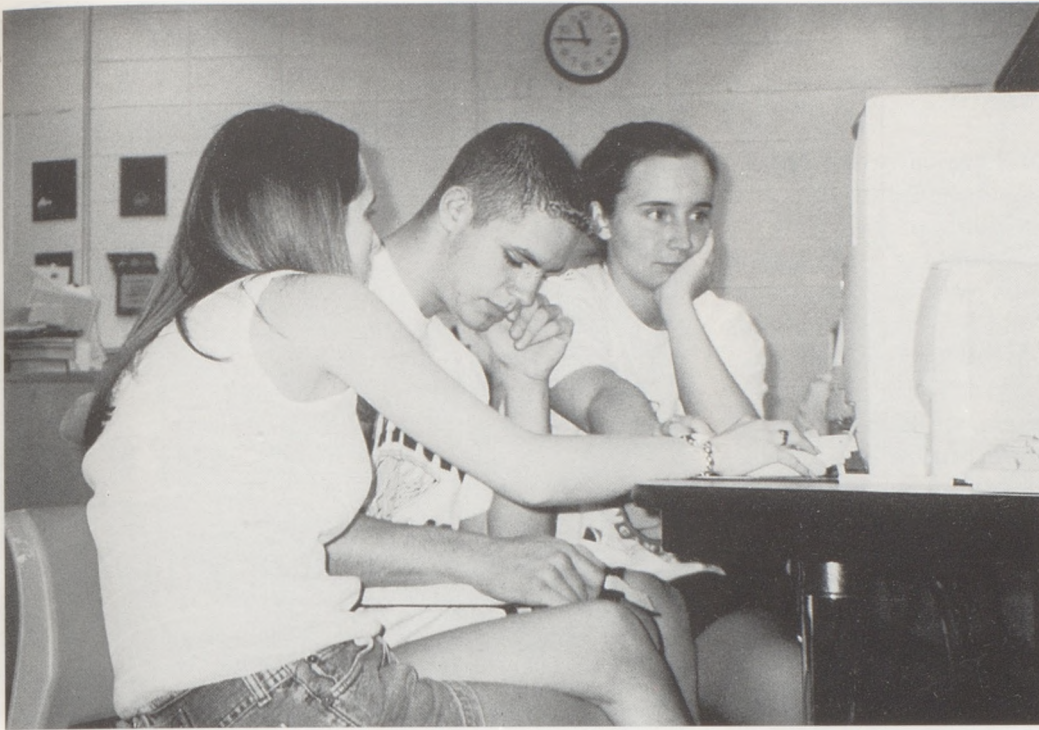

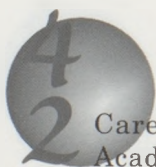

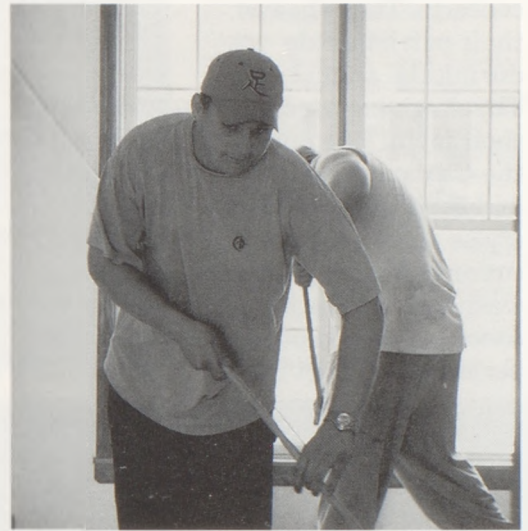

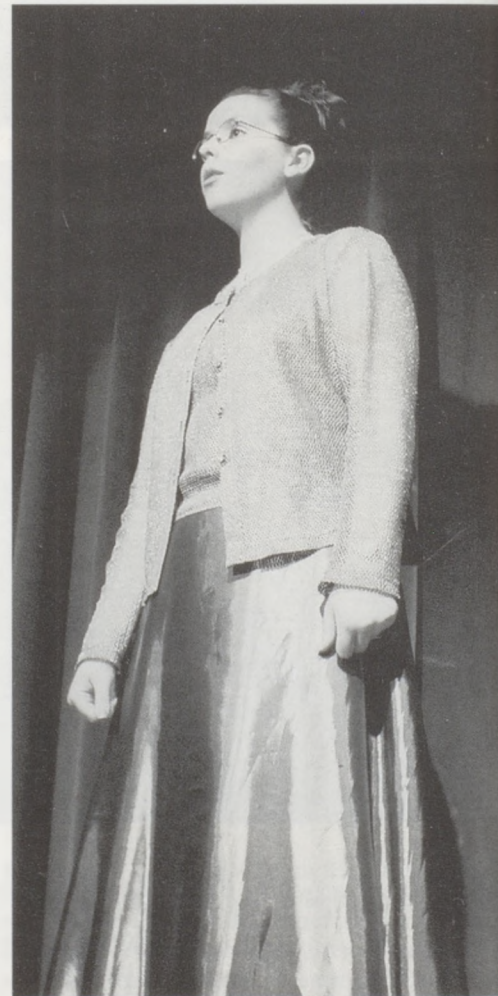

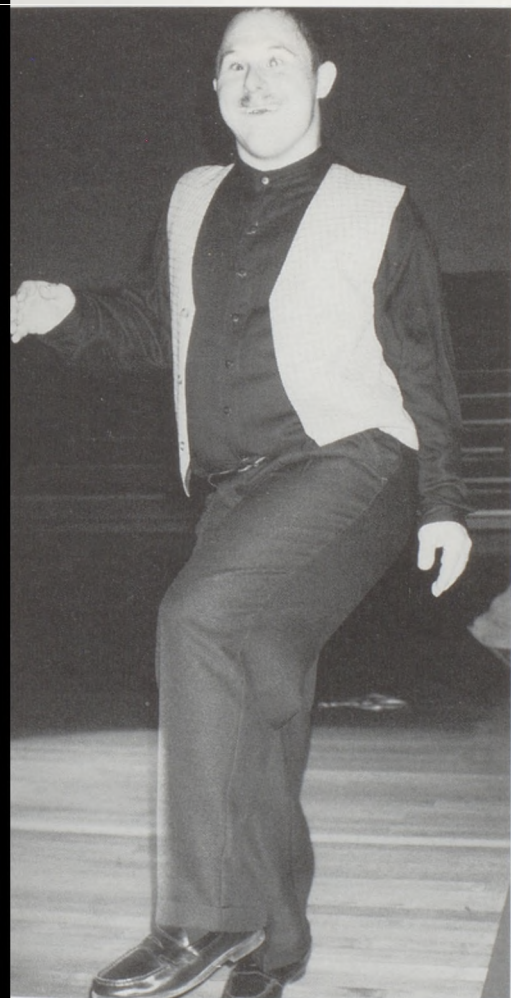

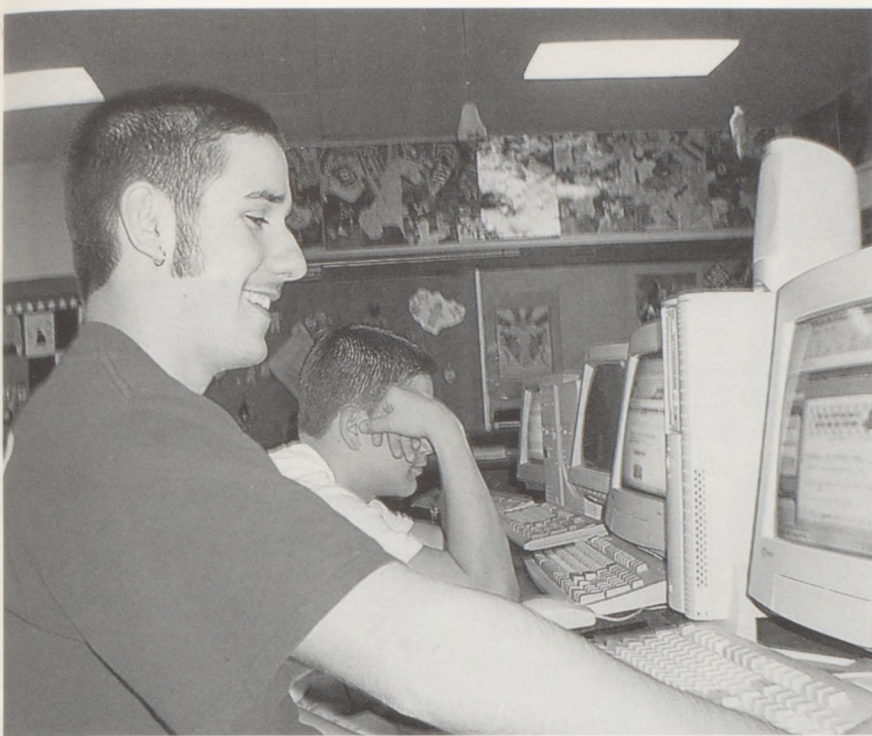

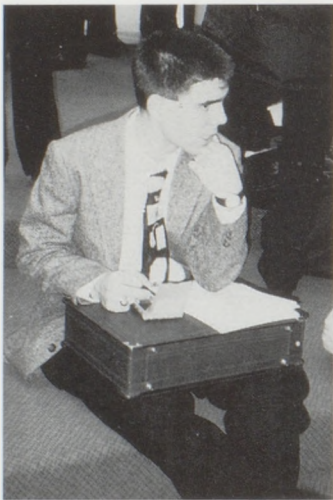

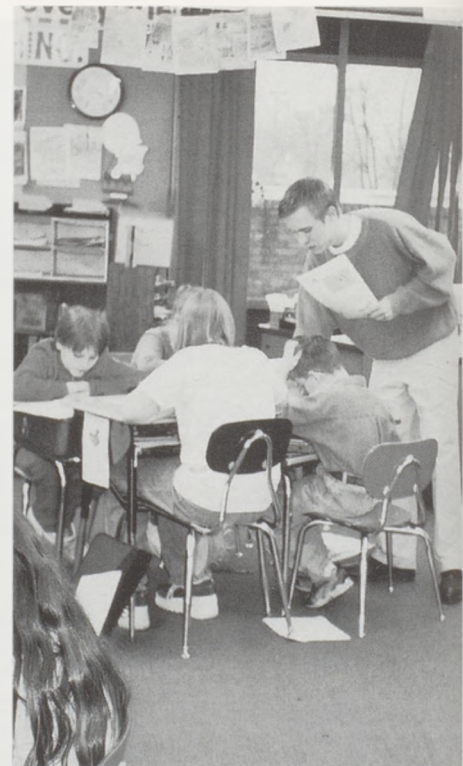

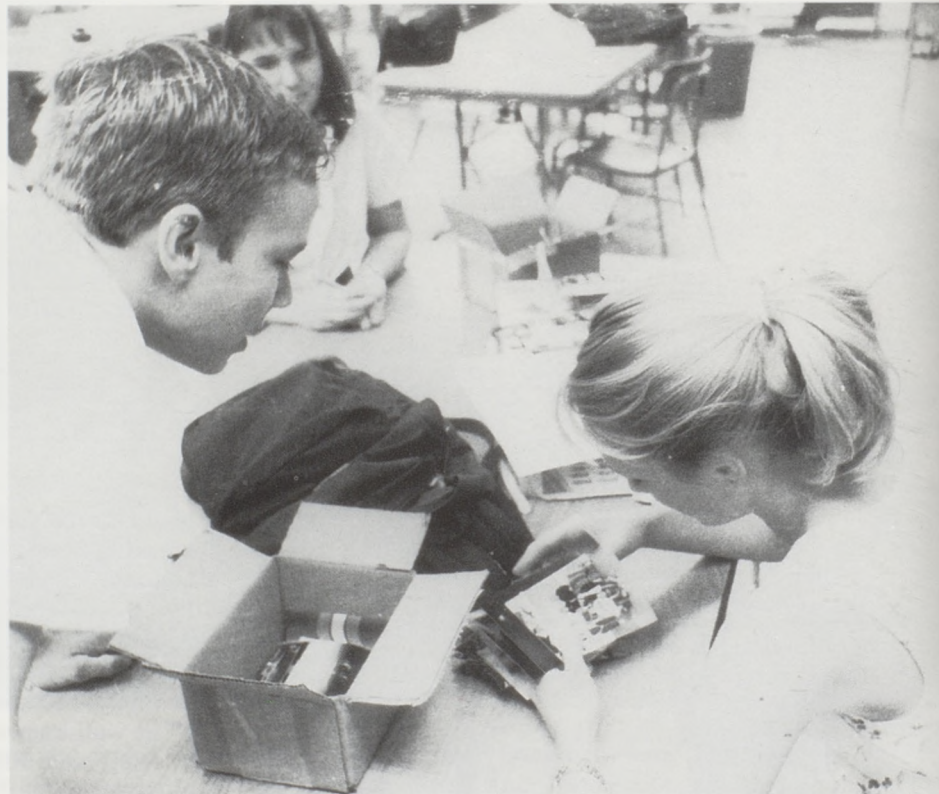
A look behind the scenes at creating the diary of the year past

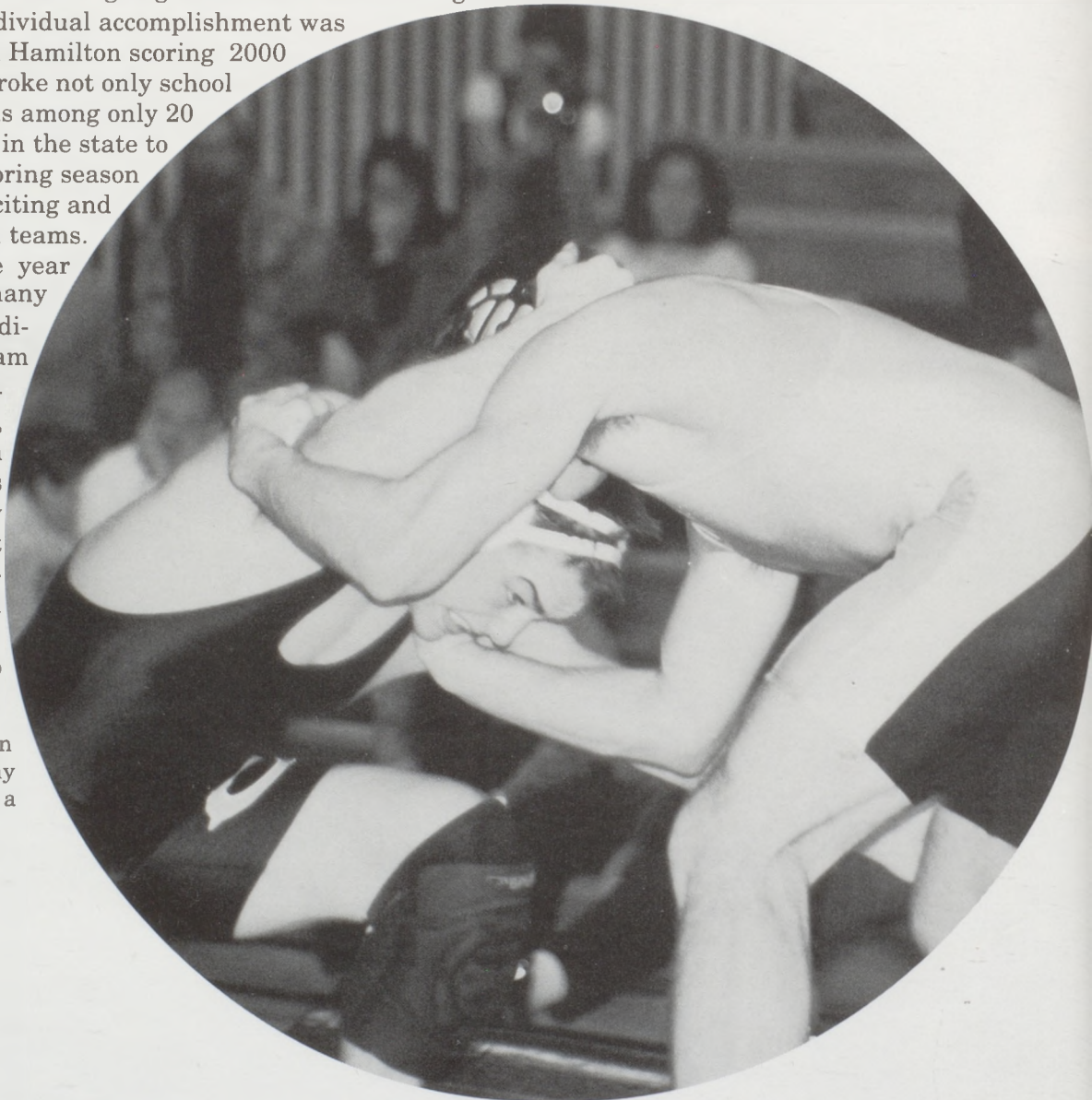
Another added individual accomplishment was

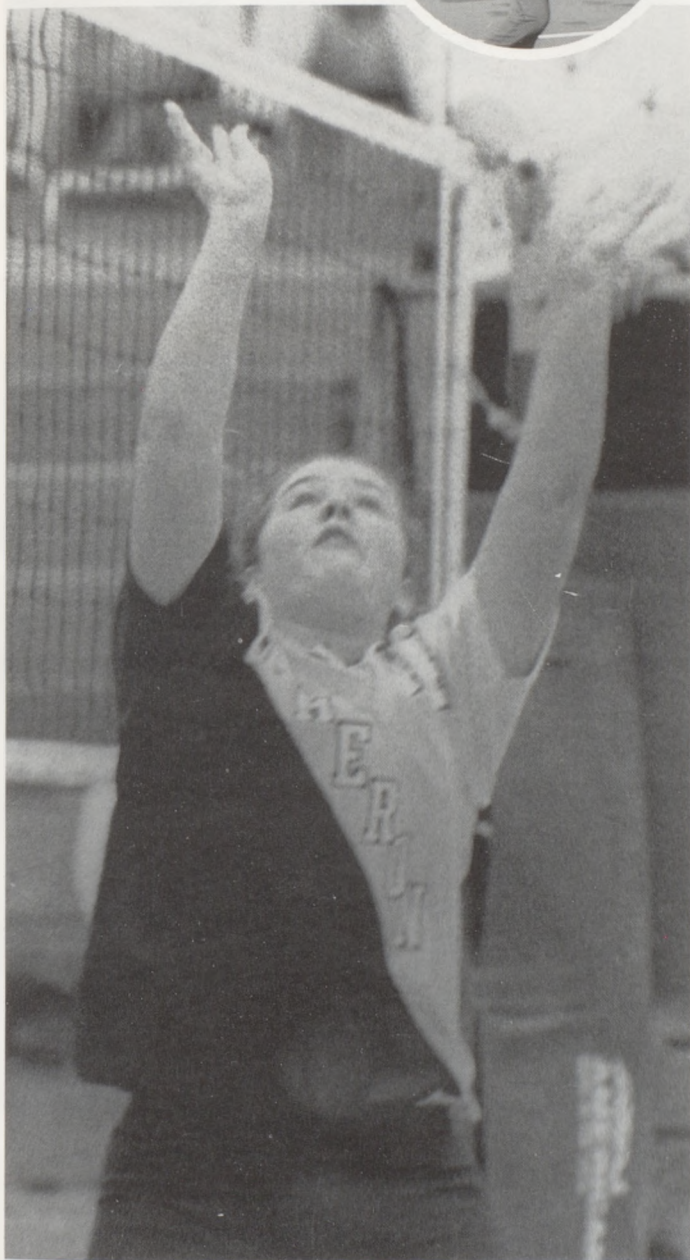

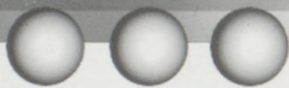

Killing off the Competition

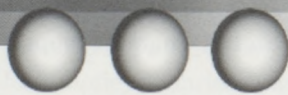

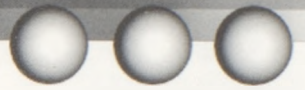

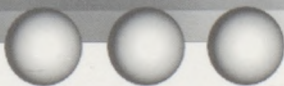

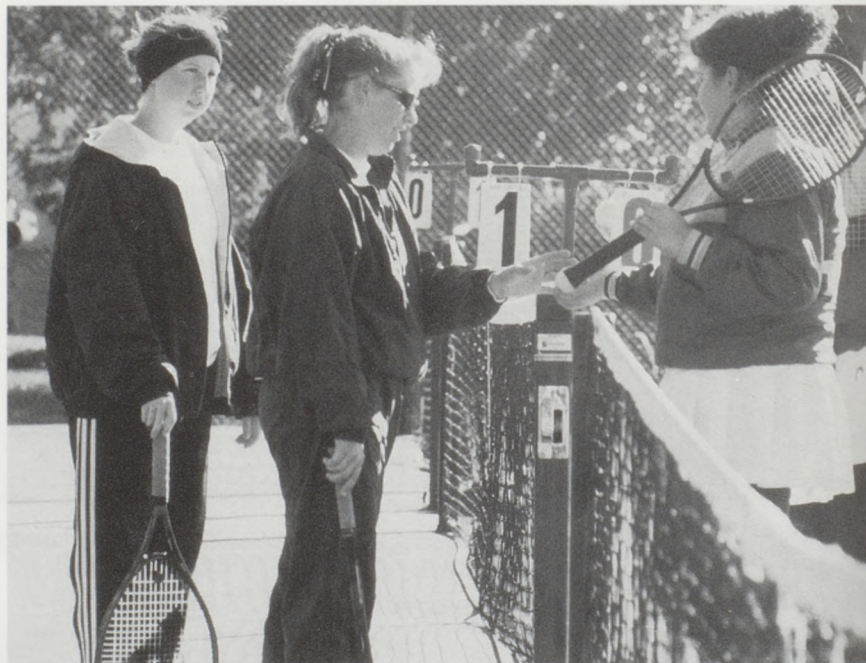
rained out.

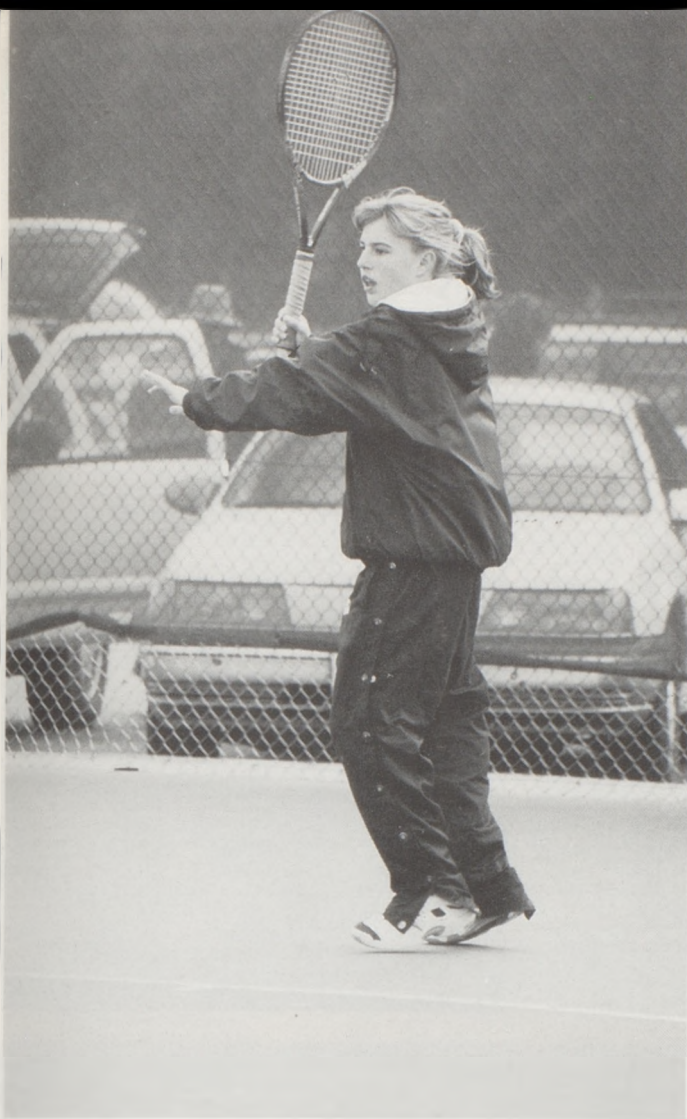

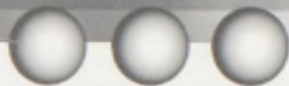

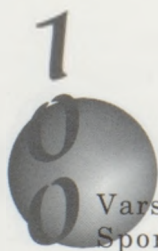

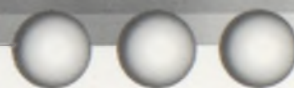

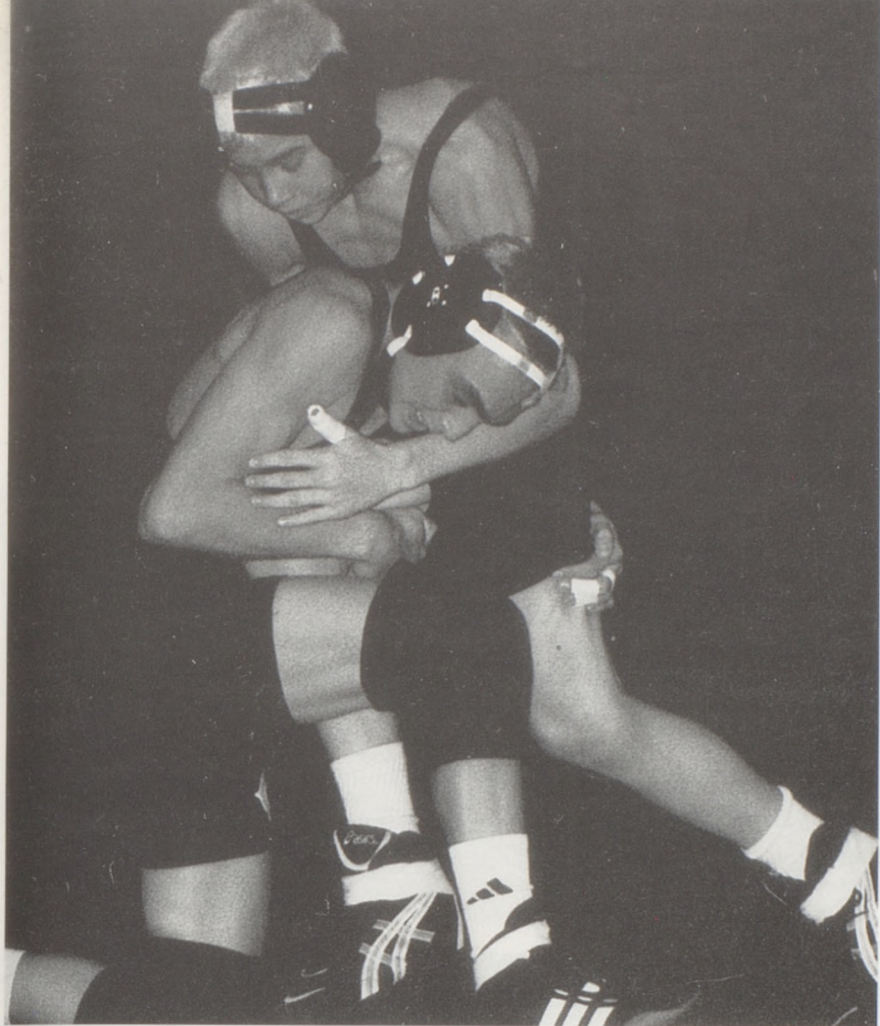

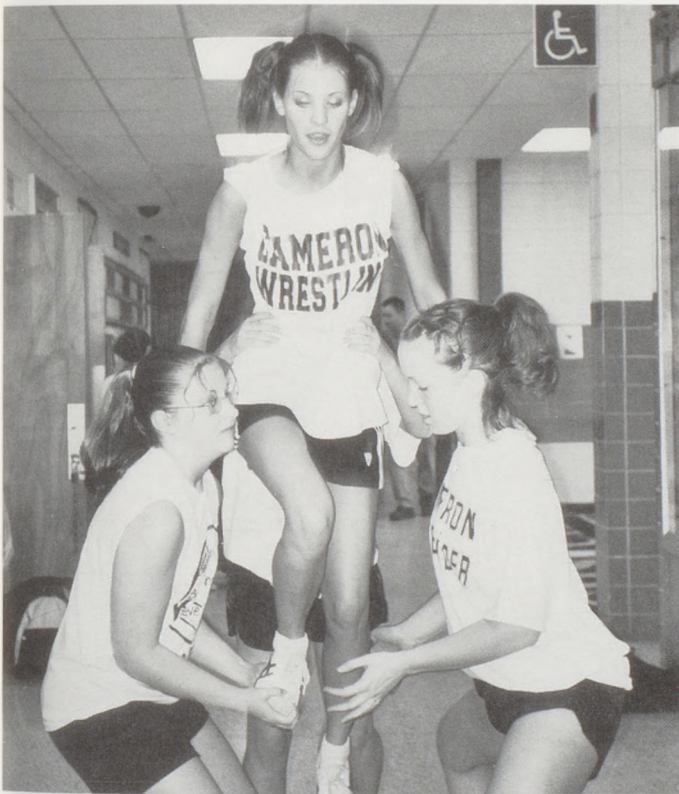

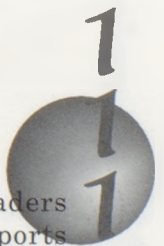

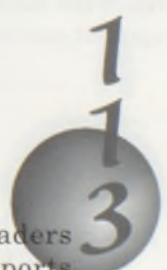

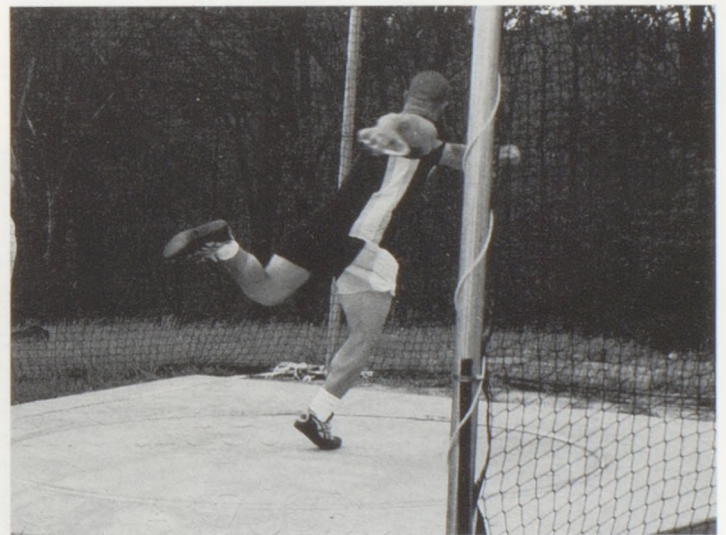

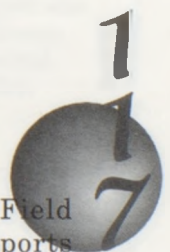

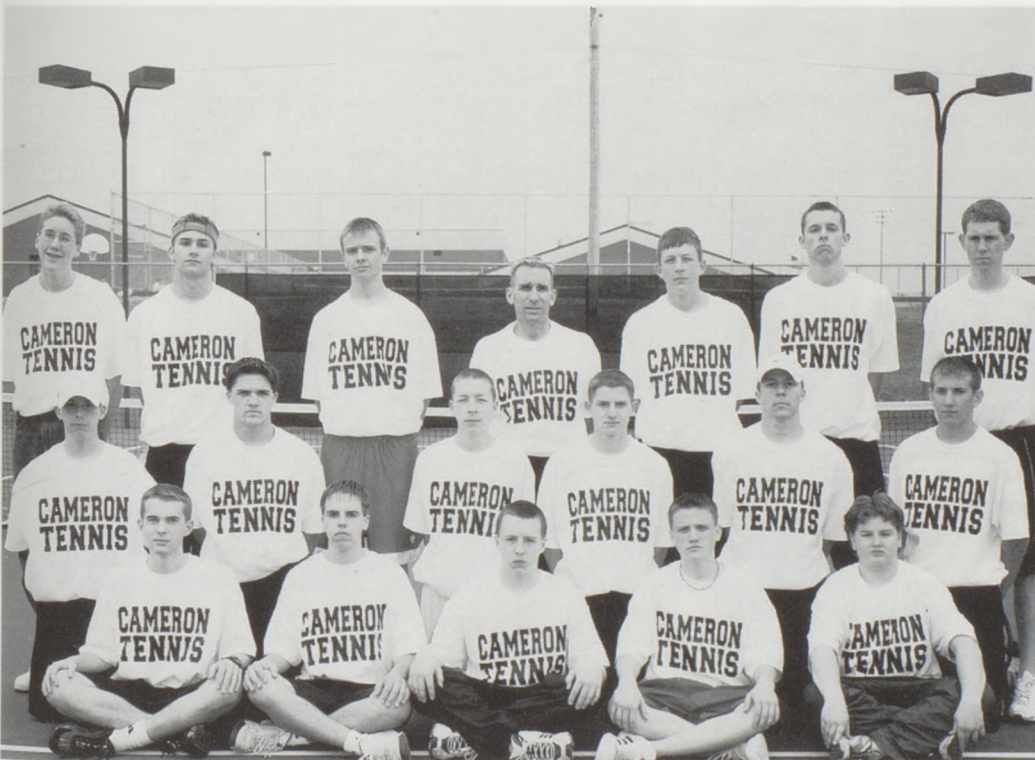

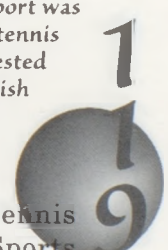

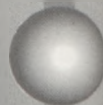

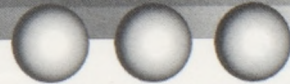

Making Some Changes

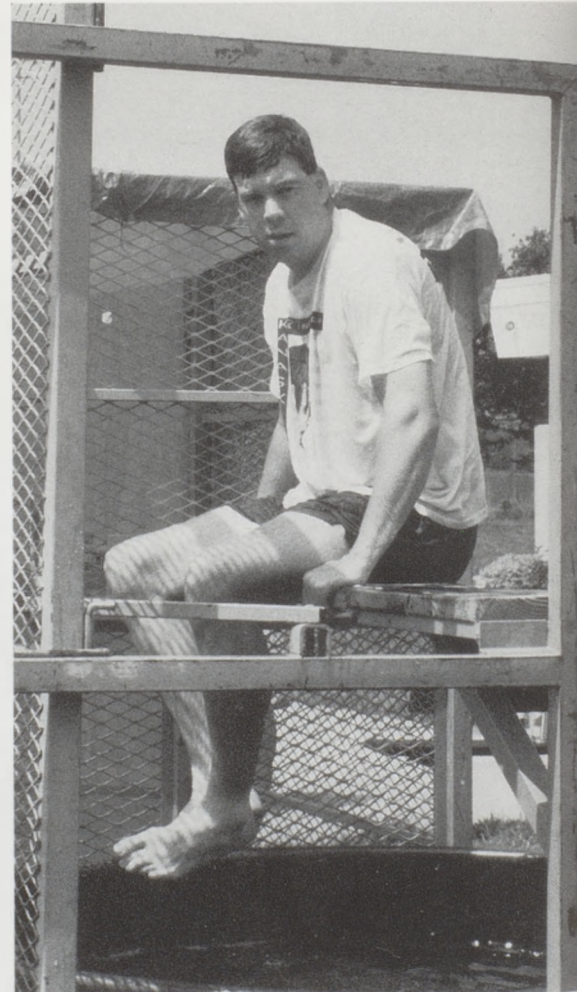

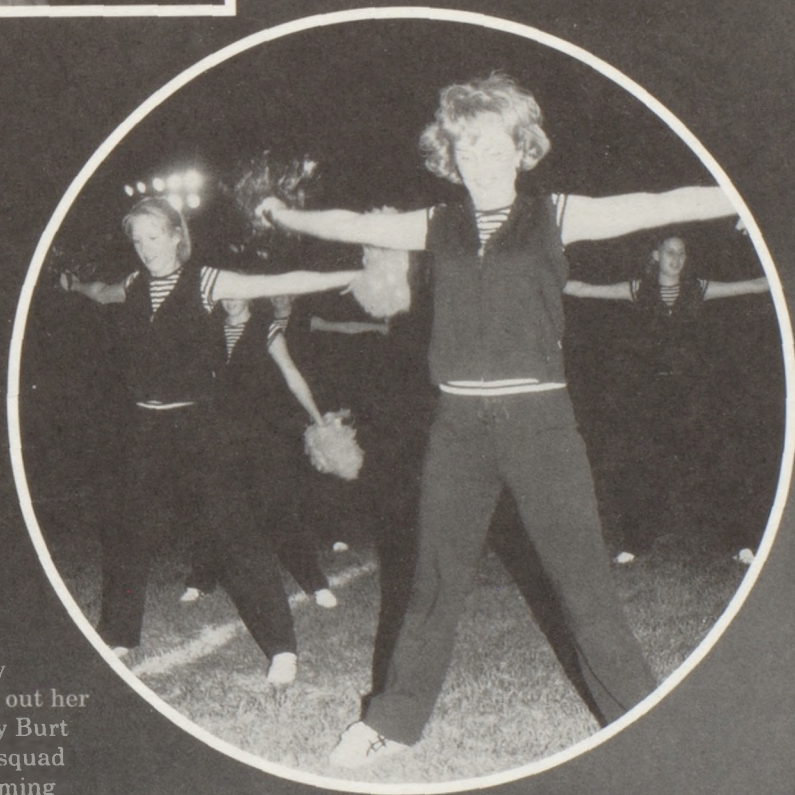
