What's new? This year many new and exciting changes took place at Cameron High School. Moving into the school at the beginning of December provided new classrooms for the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades, as well as additional storage for the band room (now connected to both schools) and another gym for team practices, games, and tournaments. Our schools continue to grow and improve as we move farther into the 21st century.

Coming from Spain, Brazil, and Slovakia, they brought different views about everyday life and embraced their cultural differences. Although the initial adjustment may have been a bit of a shock, the three seemed to adapt quickly. One major cultural difference is the obvious difference of languages. Although Jasmina has been taking English classes since her second year in school, Leo has only known the language from his three years of experience in high school classes. When asked about the contrast in education between America and Spain, Patricia told us, "The school system here is completely different. It's much easier, you have less stress, and you have more types of classes and you can choose your classes, choose things you like. The school is so different here, it's much better. I would love to have this school system in Spain."

Leonardo Moraes comes here as a junior from Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. "It's been an amazing experience. The people here are really nice. I like the food, I like the school and I like the opportunity to choose our classes and extracurricular activities."

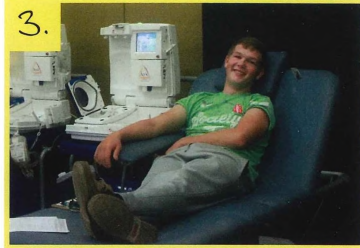
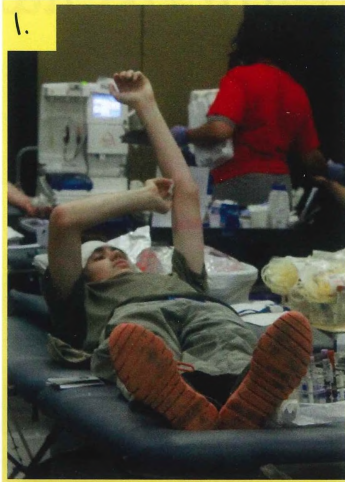

Fall Blood Drive



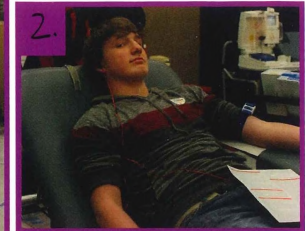

Little did CHS students know that it requires paperwork to give blood. Prior to giving blood, CHS students had to document their travel history, drug history, and sexual history. These questions became a little awkward for some students who have never been asked them before. After the medical history, a nurse took each student donor to a closed off area to get their blood pressure, temperature, and hemoglobin count (the amount of iron in the blood) taken. Once the nurses deemed the student healthy enough to give blood, the student was led to a gurney where a nurse prepped them and drew their blood. The procedure started with five vials of blood drawn for further testing before hooking the student up to a bag where one pint of blood was drawn. After cleaning up the student's arm, donors were required to eat and drink before being released so they could get some of their energy back.

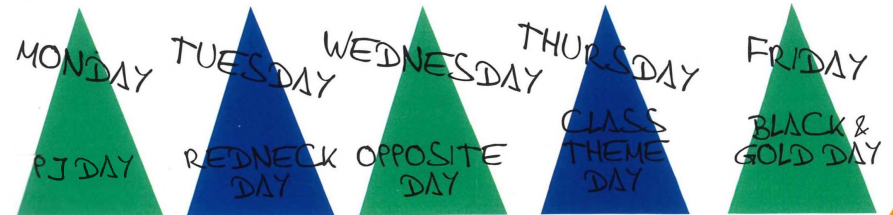

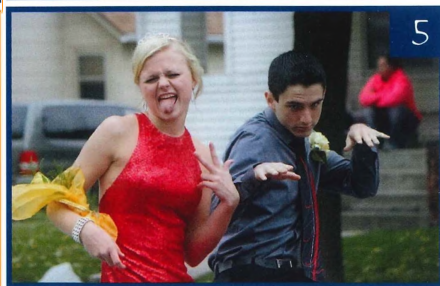

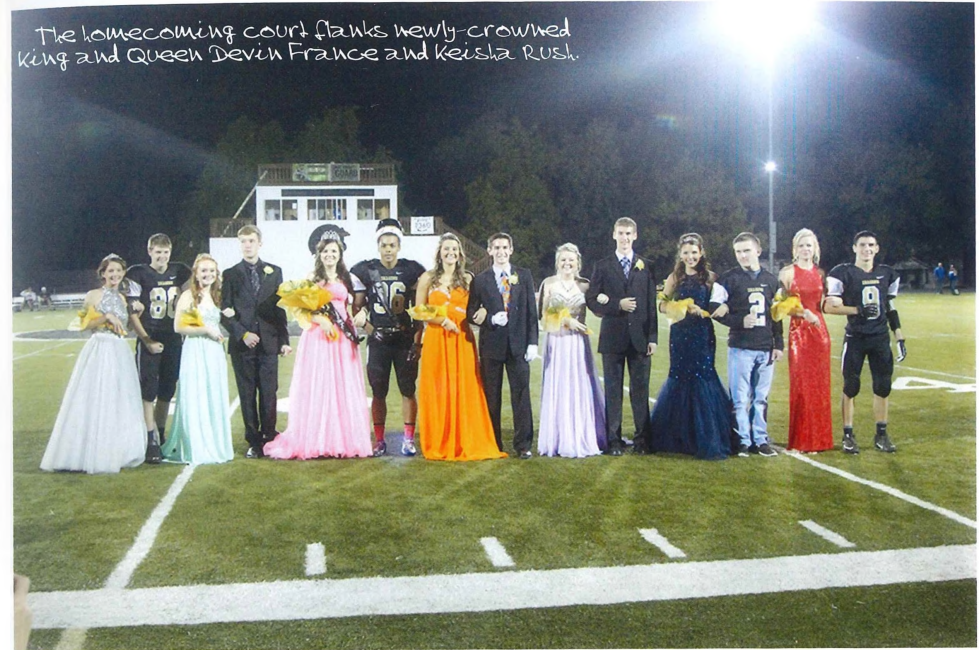

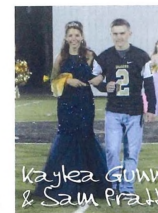

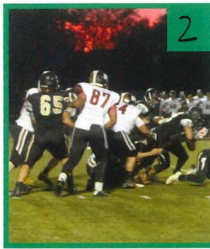

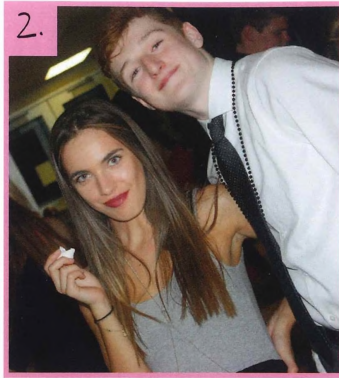

The prom attendees wave their hands in the air like they just don't care.

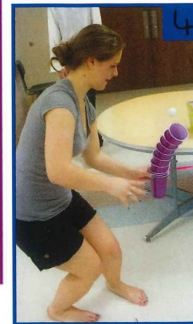
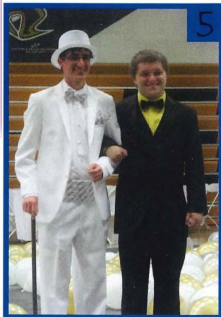
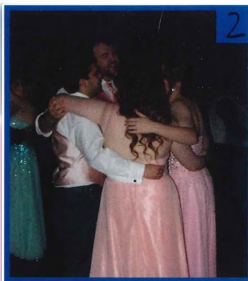

PARTY INTO THE NIGHT After Prom

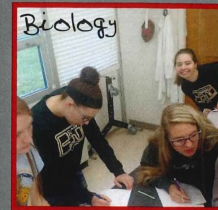

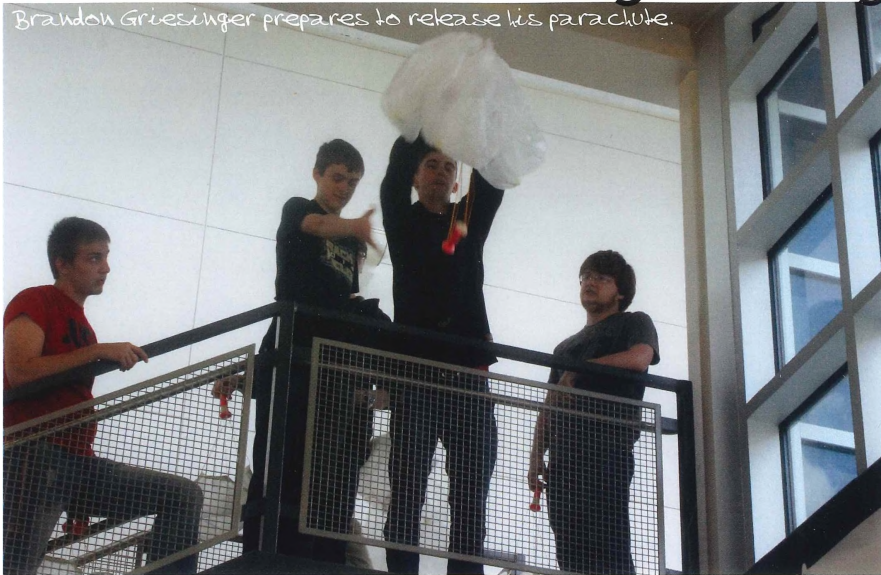

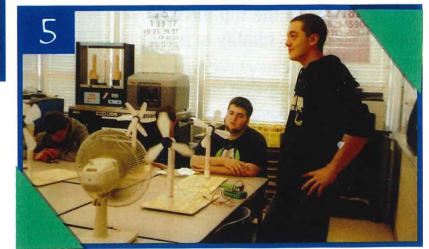

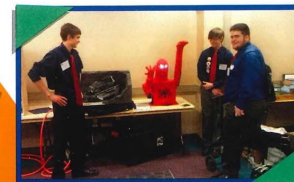

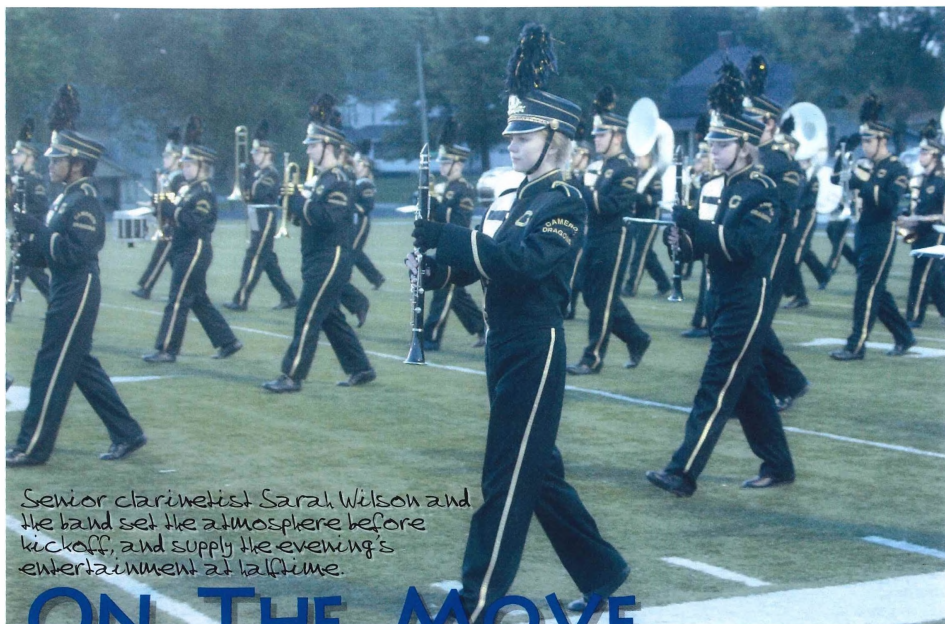

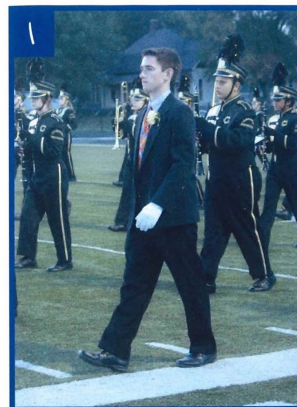
ON THE MOVE Marching Band

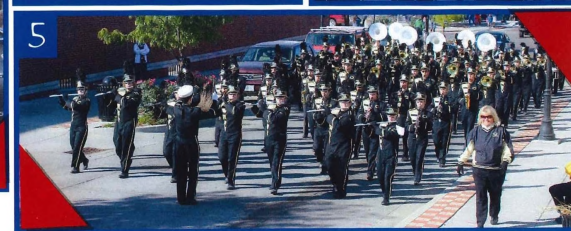

CLINIC BAND

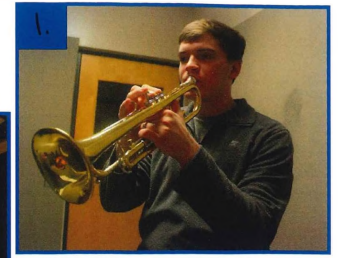

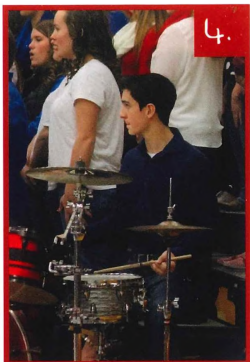

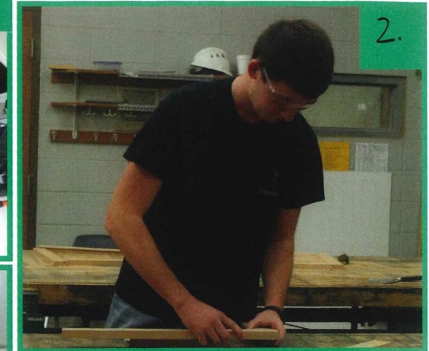

Grand River Technical School offers a variety of programs for Juniors and Seniors including Auto Services, Building Trades, Business Technology, Career Independence, Child Care Services, Collision Technology, Computer Networking Tech, Computer Service Tech, Diesel Services Tech, EMT- Paramedic, Health Services Technology, Industrial Maintenance, and Industrial Welding. Vo Tech students attend the first three and a half classes at Cameron High School, then travel to The Grand River Technical School in Chillicothe where they stay until 3 p.m. They take the bus over to Vo Tech and have to eat their lunch on the bus. This is just one of the sacrifices they must make as the bus doesn't return until 3:30, making those on sports teams late for practice every day. Senior Justin Gans, who is in the welding program, is one of the Vo Tech students involved in sports. He works it out thanks to the understanding of his coaches. When asked if it's hard to miss the first half of practice, Justin says, "No. I actually enjoy missing the first part of practice. It gets me out of running."

Vo Tech students have the option of earning college credit in certain programs. The Grand River Technical School has articulated agreements with several colleges. The program most students tend to utilize is North Central Missouri College out of Trenton. Most students choose a program because they plan on working in the field after high school. Justin Gans picked the Welding program because he wanted to make a career out of it. Students' in his program have their welds graded on their appearance and strength.

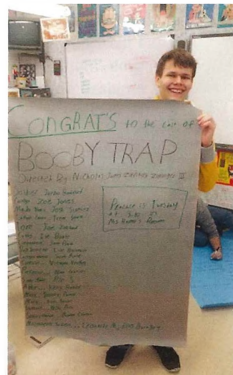
THE PERFECT TEST FOR SPRING PLAYS

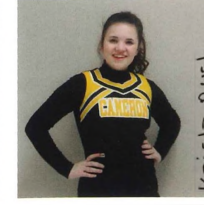

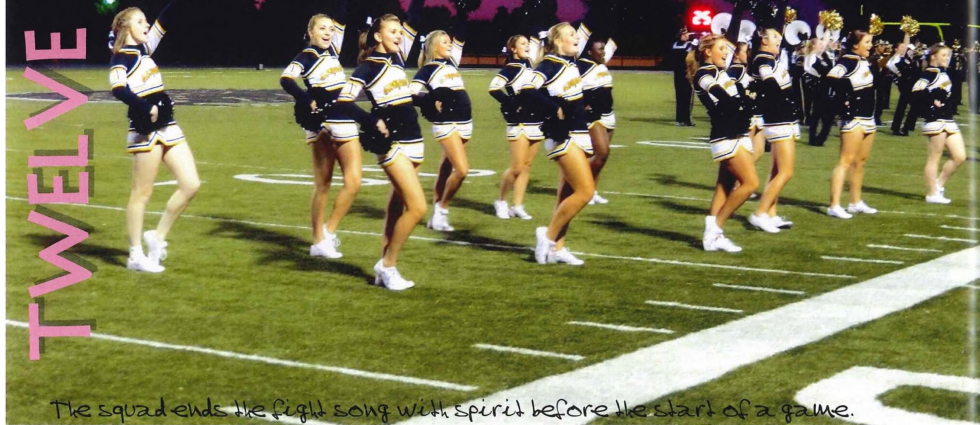

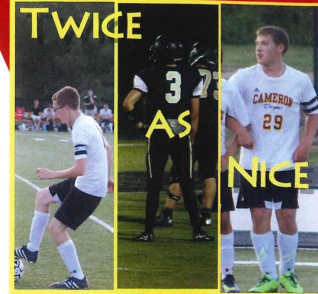

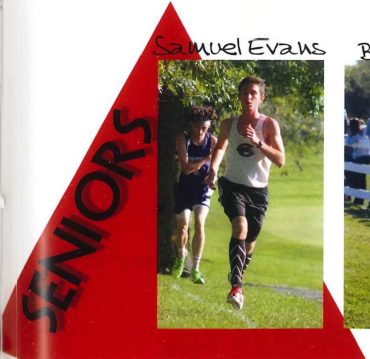

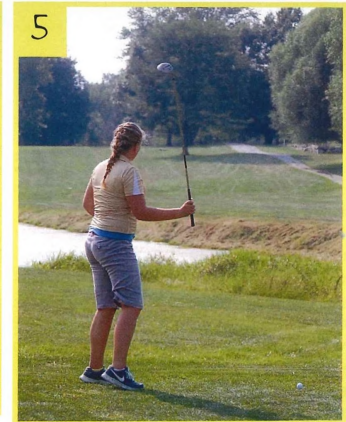

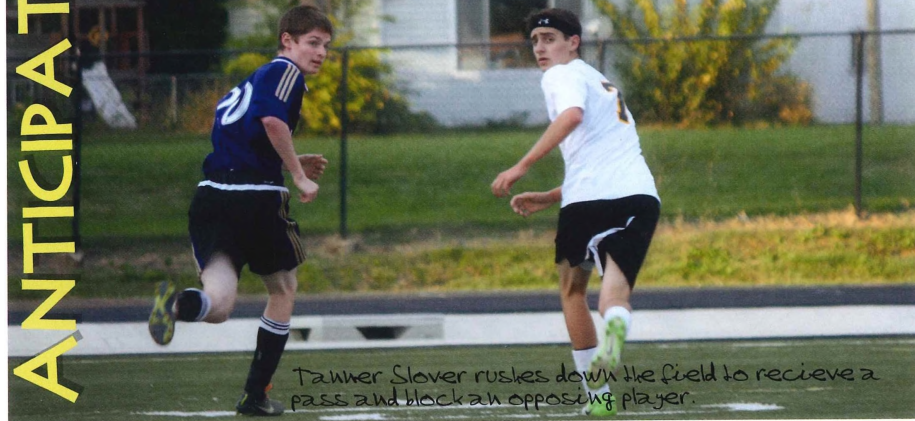

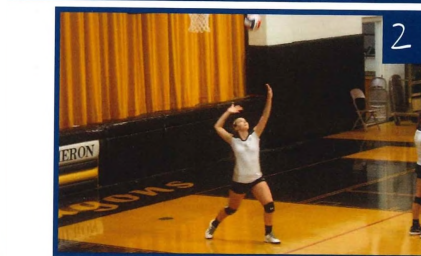

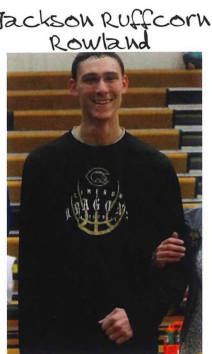

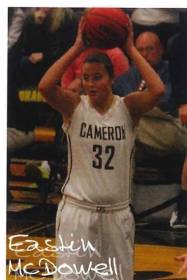

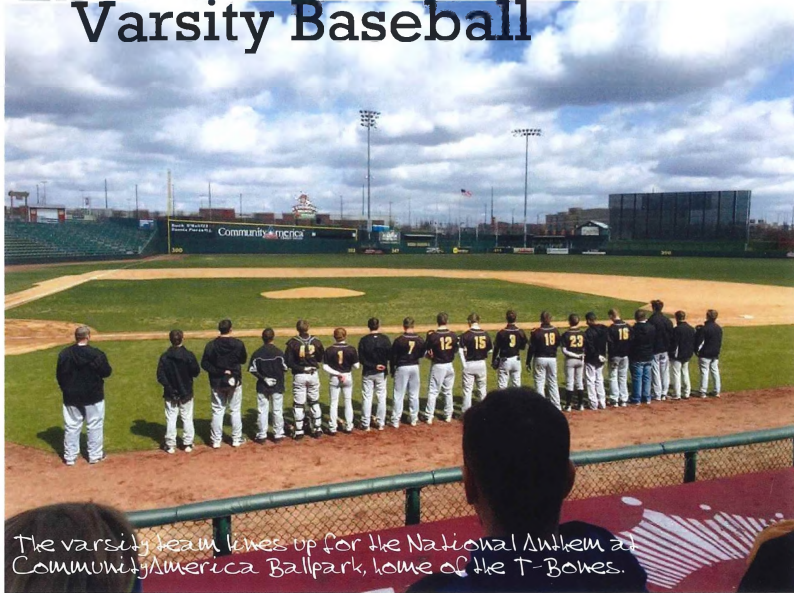


OUT OF THE PARK Freshmen/JV Baseball

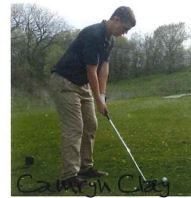
Boys Golf

Traci Lewis



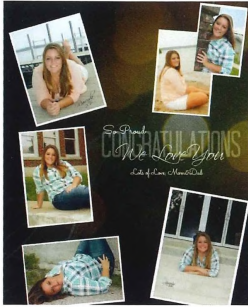

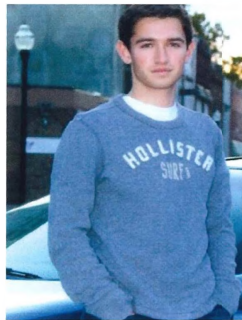
